Letter from our Vicar Anne IIsley

As I write this I have this week been surprised by the sudden flowering of daffodils and the apparent arrival of Spring. I don't know why I should be surprised by this annual event, but it's a heartening sight, which tells us that Easter and warmer weather are coming!

We are fast moving through Lent when the churches are kept quite bare, but this means that we can look forward to when they prepare themselves to greet the risen Christ in the most spectacular manner, bedecked with the most wonderful displays of flowers. For the clergy we prepare material for meditations and services during Holy Week and while Revd David Haylett will lead a quiet service for all the family at St Mary's Long Wittenham at 10.00 am, I shall lead a quiet service in 3 parts at St Michael's Clifton Hampden, from 11.00 am – 12.00 noon. This year I was

inspired by Bishop John's talk at Dorchester Abbey to try to lead the meditations so that people can experience some of the different ways of praying from the bible that he spoke about.

It is possible to arrive at Easter morning and the resurrection in such a rush, that we hardly realise how we get there. For me, preparing material for Holy Week helps me to approach the resurrection through the necessary pain of the Cross. There will be meditations at Dorchester Abbey during Holy Week to help others do the same. On Thursday the Bridge Group of Churches shall join Dorchester Abbey's congregation at the Abbey to remember the Last Supper in a simple meal together, which will take the form of a service. For those who wish to stay, this culminates in Holy Communion with the stripping of the altar.

On Friday our services will take us to the foot of the cross, leaving behind those, like the disciples, who were too frightened to watch, or those like Pilot, who wanted to disassociate himself from the scene. We go with Mary, the mother of Jesus, and John the beloved disciple. With the Roman soldiers and the thieves who died either side of Jesus, to experience their responses and to witness Jesus' incredible expressions of concern for those who witnessed his death that day.

'Dear Woman, here is your son...': 'Father forgive them – they know not what they do': 'Today you will be with me in paradise'.

On Easter Sunday morning we will gather again, this time up The Clumps, before we continue our Easter celebrations in our various churches, including St Paul's, taking the Easter light and discovering again the final drama that the tomb was empty and Jesus is risen.

Culham Parish Council Notes

March 2009

The two remaining vacancies on the CPC have been filled by Jon Woodley-Shead and Paul Gibbs who were co-opted onto the Council at the meeting. Their appointment follows the usual procedure of calling for a possible election and advertising the posts.

After discussing proposals for the burial ground slope to be reinforced with plastic matting, it was agreed that a series of steps would be safer and more appropriate. CPC will investigate the costs of installing steps opposite the gate.

The overhanging tree on the playing field has been trimmed.

A donation of £100 has been made to the school after a request for funds for specialist equipment was made.

CPC has agreed to include the cutting of the grass verge by the Church in its monthly cutting regime.

After a petition was presented by Paul Gibbs on behalf of the village to the Oxfordshire County Council opposing the siting of an incinerator at Sutton Courtenay, it was agreed that CPC will draft a letter to OCC along the same lines opposing the project. (The original petition was prior to Mr Gibbs' application to join the CPC).

CPC is still awaiting the traffic surveys on the High Street and Tollgate Road to be carried out after the enhancements to the white lines in the village were made.

The Glebe road was re-surfaced on 9th March.

Several possible areas of the village where early morning street lights could be turned off, without causing difficulties in the village, were identified by CPC for SODC. These were mainly at the Station approach and close to the Abingdon football ground. No residential areas were selected.

From the County Council (OCC)

OCC has been rated '3 star' by the Government. Next year it expects to be '4 star' (Top rating) when it implements its children and young people's services.

£300,000 has been allocated for refurbishment of the County Hall in Abingdon

£300,000 has been allocated for refurbishment of the museum in Abingdon.

£5.4m has been allocated for improvements to the exterior of Didcot Parkway rail station.

The Abingdon-Didcot bus route is to be improved.

Didcot and Wallingford libraries will undergo refurbishment.

The OCC section of the Council Tax will increase by £40.85 to £1130.60 in 2009/10

News from SODC

The changes to the waste pick up in SODC area will start in June but the new bins are likely to be distributed towards the end of March. However we are not sure when Culham will get theirs. Bags will be available for those who find it difficult to cope with (up to) 4 waste bins.

On the 19th March in Abingdon and 28th March in Oxford, there will be displays and talks about the Oxford Flood Risk Management Strategy.

SODC Council Tax will increase by 2.9% in 2009/10.

There will be the Annual Parish Meeting at the school on **Monday 20th April** at **7:30 pm** (delayed as Easter is the second Monday of April), followed by a short Council meeting.

First we would like to thank everyone who attended the Police Surgery in Culham on 19th February. The main issue raised was speeding along Tollgate Road and vehicles which are over the weight limit using the road and mounting the kerbs close to the bridge. We have assessed the roads in Culham and have found suitable areas to carry out SID (Speed Indication Devise.) This is a free standing speed device monitored by Police or PCSO's that tells the driver and police the speed of each vehicle. Details are gathered and the offending drivers will receive a warning letter. Three or more letters may result in a prosecution or Speed Awareness Course. The Benson and Berinsfield team are carrying out SID throughout the month. Updates will be posted in the next article and/or Police Surgery.

Rhododendrons - Large and Small

When you look closely at a Rhododendron flower, it is truly an amazing piece of work. And not only the detail of the flower itself but the way it sits amongst the foliage gives the impression of real plant perfection. Rhododendrons have been a familiar sight in this country since the middle of the nineteenth century when the Victorian collectors and plant hunters began bringing back specimens predominantly from China, Japan, and the Himalayas. Yet they retain their exotic beauty and still make a great impact wherever you come across them.

Anyone who has wandered through a spring garden bursting with Rhododendrons in flower must want to enjoy a slice of that glory on their own patch. The good news is that anyone can. At its simplest, dwarf Rhododendrons can be enjoyed in containers on a patio or balcony. The Yakushimanum (otherwise known as 'Yak') hybrids grow slowly and with the right feeding and watering will put on glorious displays of flowers year after year without ever out-growing their space. Container growing allows all the benefits of being able to get the soil conditions just right (acid soil is a must although the RHS has been running long-term trials on lime-tolerant varieties) and you can relocate your plants as the fancy takes you. Handy if you're moving house.

If you've got more space and the soil is right you can make them a bigger part of the garden. Combine them with ferns, perhaps in the dappled shade of mature trees. Hostas make great partners too. Try matching the sumptuous *Rhododendron* 'Blue Peter' for example with *Hosta fortunei* to get maximum value from the lilac flower heads of the Rhododendron. A worthwhile guideline to bear in mind is that the more floriferous the variety, the less suitable it will be for naturalistic settings. For this reason, the really showy examples, like *Rhododendron* 'Linda', with its vivid cerise flowers, are best nearer the house. Even 'Linda' however can be moderated by planting in combination with cooler flowers, for example bluebells.

Bigger Rhododendrons have the potential to provide useful screening against eyesores or for protection from a busy road. Hardy hybrid or 'iron-clad' evergreen Rhododendrons are perfect for these situations. *Rhododendron* 'Cynthia' is one such variety, reaching a height and spread of 20m in ideal circumstances and would be effective in this situation. Equally however there are dwarf alpine varieties that are perfect in rock gardens, for example 'Dora Amateis' which bears lovely white flowers in spring and achieves a maximum height and spread of only 60cm.

The wonderful world of Rhododendrons brings colour and interest for much of the year but it is in spring that the greatest glories occur. Make your selection for your situation and as long as you give them a helping hand as they become established, they will bring you joy for many years to come.
