

From Our Assistant Priest

By the time you come to read this we will probably be some two weeks into Lent, heading towards Mothering Sunday which comes almost exactly halfway through Lent. That is why it used sometimes to be called "Refreshment Sunday", a time when it was OK to take a breather from Lenten disciplines. In this more secular age when Lenten disciplines are largely ignored by our society and Mothering Sunday has been transformed into "Mothers Day", an American invention, which will be observed, depending on which country you live in, on either the first or second Sunday in May, perhaps the idea of a break from Lent is not necessary. MOTHERING SUNDAY is on March 14th.



So how are you observing Lent? Perhaps the question should be, "Are you observing Lent?" Is it by some sort of token nod to "discipline" by giving up chocolate, or walking instead of taking the car for short journeys? I sometimes think we ought, not to "give something up" for Lent, but to take something on.

For example there is, once again this year, a series of Lenten lunches, ably organised by Anne Walsh and spread across the three parishes of the Bridge Group. The first one in March is on Wednesday 3rd at Rye Farm House Culham, the following Wednesday it is at Church Farm, Long Wittenham, and so on every Wednesday throughout March. Any time between noon and 2pm you can sample delicious home-made soups at no charge but make a donation (£3 minimum) to your choice of one of two charities, either PACT (Parents And Children Together) which is a local charity, or to the work of the South African Diocese of Kimberley and Kuruman.

Or again, you might like to join a house group – discussing a book written by the Bishop of Reading, "Things He Carried". You do not need to buy a copy of the book, although it is quite inexpensive and contains more than can be discussed in a short series of meetings, but you may feel sufficiently interested to buy your own copy and read more. Stretch your mind a little, learn something new, come along and share with your neighbours ideas put forward by the Bishop and by others in your group.

Yet again you might like to consider coming to church services a little more frequently than you usually do. Sunday is the obvious time when the "main" services are held, but perhaps you might like to join the dozen or so of us who meet for an informal Communion at 9.30 on Wednesday morning in Berinsfield Church. Or again Anne and I say Morning Prayer in the various churches of our Group weekday mornings at 8 or 8.30am. If you would like to join us, we would welcome your company.

Then again on Maundy Thursday the congregations of the Bridge churches and the Abbey meet in Dorchester Abbey in the evening for a meal and re-enactment of the Last Supper. This is a very moving, but simple, act of worship. Good Friday services are observed in Long Wittenham, Clifton Hampden and Dorchester Abbey. Then on Easter Day at 10am there are joyful services of Holy Communion in Clifton Hampden, Culham and Long Wittenham. In "the old days" it was considered obligatory to take Communion on Easter Day. It would be really great if all our churches were full to overflowing to celebrate the Resurrection.

Have a thought provoking Lent and a joyful Easter.

Newington Nurseries - Oranges and Lemons

Citrus plants are sub-tropical and tropical evergreen shrubs, and despite their exotic appearance, are easy to grow at home. This beautiful evergreen plant provides year-round interest: white, highly fragrant flowers are followed by tasty fruits which take between 3 and 6 months to fully ripen.

Citrus has long been in cultivation, both the fruits and leaves being used in foods and medicines over many centuries. The first recorded Citrus plant in the UK was *Citrus aurantium* (Seville Orange), brought from South East Asia to these shores in the late 16th century. By the mid 18th century, lemons (*C. limon*) and limes (*C. aurantifolia*) were being used by the Royal Navy to help sailors combat scurvy.

There are around 16 species within the Citrus family, covering oranges, lemons, limes, grapefruits and their hybrids. All will perform well in pots and most are self-pollinating. Fruits start to ripen in autumn or early winter depending on the cultivar. For example, tangerines will ripen by winter but grapefruits can take up to eighteen months to mature.

All varieties of Citrus will need re-potting every few years, either into larger containers or by cutting back the outer roots and re-potting with fresh and free-draining compost (add

horticultural sand or grit to improve drainage). A third of the canopy should be cut back annually and any damaged or dead stems removed. To improve crop quality, excess fruits can also be removed.

The optimum minimum temperature for Citrus is around 10°C although short bursts of temperatures as low as 2°C should not harm the plant as long as the soil is not wet. In fact, Citrus needs to be in a cool environment during the winter months to allow the plant to rest.

Citrus will tolerate high summer temperatures provided there is good airflow around the plant. Open the conservatory on a hot day. Better still, move the plant outside during the summer months. Acclimatise the plant first by moving it to a sheltered and shady position for 2 to 3 weeks then reposition into a sunny and sheltered area. When autumn arrives, move to a shady area in the garden for a couple of weeks then bring back indoors for the winter months. This will minimise stress on the leaves.

Citrus plants should be watered frequently but not excessively and frequency of watering depends on the soil composition and ambient temperatures. Generally speaking, water well in a warm summer and reduce watering to a minimum in the winter months. A good indicator of incorrect watering is leaf colour and texture. Soft, yellow leaves indicate over-watering whilst dry, yellow leaves that easily fall off the plant indicate under-watering.

Although Citrus can tolerate most soil conditions, they prefer a slightly acid medium. Established plants are less prone to disease problems than younger plants although scale and aphids can be an issue in a greenhouse or conservatory environment. Control any outbreaks of this nuisance with a horticultural soap (a highly refined soap made from natural oils which acts as a contact insecticide with no residual effects once it has dried) spray.

Lack of nutrients turns the leaves chlorotic (parts of the leaves turn white or yellow) so it is important to feed Citrus plants during the growing period. Use a specific citrus feed which contains the correct balance of trace elements.

So enjoy your lemons and limes in gins and tonics and your oranges and grapefruits in marmalades or desserts!
