

Culham Parish Council Notes, October 2011 - Andrew Steele

Update from OCC (Lorraine Lindsay-Gail)

The area stewardship fund has been fixed at £1m and is avalable for fourteen locations in the Berinsfield/Benson/Wallingford areas. The fund is not available for road pothole filling but can be applied for against items that don't usually get fixed. After some discussion a potential upgrade to the traffic lights at the Waggon was suggested. This would allow a pedestrian control of the lights for crossing the road.

OCC are 'rationalising' their holdings in a similar manner to SODC. This may allow some properties to be sold.

The Viridor MBT (Mechanical Biological Treatment Facility) at Sutton Courtenay has been turned down by planning but a bio-digester has now been applied for.

The incinerator proposal for Ardley is now at the appeal court.

The minerals and waste consultation is on-going until 31 October.

Other news

Dr Toby Price has decided to stand down as CPC chairman and councillor after 10 years' service.

CPC is investigating the possibility of finding grants etc. for using the Waggon and Horses as a community run/owned pub – but it is early days yet!

The salt bin and salt destined for placement close to the school have been ordered.

The burial ground slope improvement is to go ahead.

A 'Community Building Committee' (of three) has been formed informally. Anyone wishing to assist or join the committee please contact any Parish Councillor in the first instance.

Talking Point - Revd. David Cleugh

How do we deal with our enemies?

As I am writing this there is some discussion in the international community about how we might engage in dialogue with the Taliban in Afghanistan. This process is fraught with danger - a former president of Afghanistan has recently been killed by a suicide bomber who was representing the Taliban in talks. A first look at the difference in value systems between the Taliban and the West looks like a gulf too wide to bridge. We will have to wait to see how these talks progress and whether they will bear fruit.

An example closer to home, and for that matter further down the road to peace, would be our government engaging in talks with the IRA in Northern Ireland. Although the situation there remains far from perfect, the years of relative peace since agreement in 1998 show real progress in the situation there.

For me this raises the question about how we talk to those with whom we fundamentally differ. Is it possible to agree to disagree on some matters whilst working together on those areas on which you agree? This all takes a degree of trust. If we cannot trust the person with whom we are negotiating, then we cannot continue. How do we build up this mutual trust? This is a risky business but potentially rewarding. In getting to know those who are different from us we open up a space for discovery - we better understand the person on the opposite side of the argument and how they come to hold their views and hopefully they better understand our position.

We probably all have some situation in our lives where there are people we find it difficult to talk to, sometimes because our views differ, or we come from different cultures or through a falling-out. How and when we start the process is difficult to judge, but all journeys, no matter how long, begin with a single step.

Heathers - Acid or Alkaline?

Heathers seem to confuse us. Do they like acid soil? Do they like alkaline soil? It depends on the species in fact. Some require acid soil conditions to thrive. Others will grow in neutral and alkaline soils. Flowering time also causes headaches. Again, all is dependent on the species.

Calluna vulgaris heathers are acid loving plants as are Erica cinera, E. x stuartii and E. vagans as well as the taller-growing E. arborea. Callunas and E. vagans flower late summer to early autumn whereas Erica cinera and E. x stuartii can flower from early summer onwards. In contrast, *Erica carnea* and *E. x darleyensis* cultivars thrive in lime tolerant conditions and flower from early to mid winter until early summer. In other words, these very under-rated plants provide year-round interest and colour.

A heather bed should be positioned in full sun, away from deciduous trees. Foliage heathers colour much better when planted in a bright and sunny position. Try and plant in groups of 3 or 5, or more, to create impact. Plant heathers deeply with the lower foliage resting on the soil surface. Bark mulch the bed to keep weeds at bay. Pruning is done annually making heathers really low maintenance plants. In general, trimming retards the flowering by two to three weeks. Prune as follows:

- Calluna vulgaris February or March, prune long flowering spikes back to plant. Trim off all flower heads.
- Erica carnea Every other April or May, trim flower heads with shears. Trim the more vigorous cultivars hard to stop the centre going bare.
- Erica cinerea February or March, trim off dead flowers particularly long flowering spikes.
- Erica x stuartii April or May, trim off dead flowers.
- Erica arborea After flowering, trim half of previous year's growth for the first four years to encourage bushy growth; trim off broken branches. Stake for support.
- **Erica x darleyensis** Trim each June. Do not be afraid of limiting growth.
- Erica vegans Leave flower heads on for russet colours during winter. Trim every March. Do not be afraid of limiting growth.
