Allowing your dog to foul in a public place is illegal.

Many local authorities and Parish councils have 'Dog Control Orders', which make it easier to introduce dog controls on private land. Dog control orders can be used to make the person in charge of a dog clear up any mess that it leaves behind. The penalty for committing an offence contained in a Dog Control Order is a maximum fine of £1,000. Alternatively, a fixed penalty of up to may be offered in place of prosecution.

#### Vicar; Anne IIsley

A recent article in the Church Times decried the amount of time and effort that goes into the conservation of church buildings in England. After all for faith to exist we do not need dedicated buildings in which to gather for worship and teaching to happen and even to flourish. The early church certainly met in people's homes. I am aware that there are people living here in The Bridge group who sympathise with this sentiment, but I am also aware of something that amounts to more than good will towards our churches.

For one thing members of the community, not necessarily regular 'church goers' help to look after the building, through joining the cleaning rota, arranging flowers, opening up the church, or belonging the 'The Friends'. For some of these helpers and for some who simply come into the church to sit in the quiet beauty that they find there, simply coming into the building is an opportunity to recharge and be refreshed.

These buildings do 'belong' in a very special way to all of the community and there is a movement to reclaim the community role of the building that it would have had in earlier times. In Stadhampton, for example building work is due to begin so that the church can also serve as a village hall. Of course such a plan only goes forward under the close scrutiny of the Church's own planning system and the preservation of all that we value about the atmosphere of the church is crucial to how such a scheme is received.

In The Bridge group St Peter's Little Wittenham was hidden by scaffolding last year and this year we expect to be the turn of St Michael's Clifton Hampden. In both cases repairs to the stonework will give new life to the fabric. Meanwhile in The Wittenhams the attention of the PCC is turning to plans for St Mary's. Here in Culham, St Paul's has been kept in good repair, but the quinquennial survey (an architect's survey required every 5 years) is expected to point out something in the way of necessary works. It usually does! The help of members of 'The Friends' of the churches is essential to all these efforts and so far we have been successful in gaining grants from grant making bodies, which has enabled work to proceed.

A well cared for church building does speak to the very many visitors who come inside, especially throughout the summer, so thank you for caring and for doing something practical where you can. My prayer is that you are rewarded with peace and tranquility and a sense of the

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Prisoner of War Memories Wanted

A child's necklace and a pair of soldier's dog-tags...what do these have in common? Both of these very personal items belonged to a Prisoner of War (POW) during World War II, but each

tells a different story. These mementos are now being looked after by The Soldiers of Oxfordshire Museum in Woodstock, who are planning an exhibition about POW experiences and are appealing to the public for help in bringing the new museum to life.

The necklace was given to a young girl during the war, having been made by a German POW held at a local camp. It was donated, along with other hand-made pieces by Rosemary Warner from Witney. Local POWs often made toys and children's playthings to sell for a little extra cash.

The dog-tags are a reminder of one young man's time in the StalagLuft III camp, now in Poland, and infamous for the 'Great Escape'. Sgt Leslie Mitchell from Woodstock was captured aged just 19 after his plane came down in 1940. He remained a prisoner until 1945, moved from camp to around the German occupied territories. All the time he kept in touch with home, and the letters sent to him provide a fascinating insight into war-time Oxfordshire.

If you have personal memories of POWs during the Second World War or if you were a prisoner yourself, SOFO would like to hear from you. We would be also interested in hearing about experiences of relatives who were POWs. Matthew Smaldon from SOFO says:

"We are seeking first-hand accounts, memorabilia, written memoirs, photos, letters, and other items relating to POWs. We want to tell the story of local men held in POW camps, and of how the influx of German and Italian POWs also affected life in the county - to do so we want to ask for the assistance of Oxfordshire residents to help us build the story."

#### Local Police – Sarah Jones

The local priority for Benson and Berinsfield is theft from vehicles and burglary. There has been an increase in tools being stolen from vehicles and also burglaries to outbuildings in particular in the Warborough, Shillingford and Benson area.

This month we have had an increase in theft from vehicles and criminal damage to vehicles, particularly in Berinsfield and Benson. Various items such as radios and tools have been taken and on one occasion a catalytic convertor was taken from a vehicle. Weurge everyone to remove items of value from vehicles when leaving them parked.

Parking is something that your neighbourhood officers deal with on a day to day basis and we rely on local residents to keep us informed of any issues arising. We understand that inconsiderate and illegal parking can both be frustrating and dangerous and we will assess and deal with all reports appropriately. Vehicles parked illegally or causing an obstruction can be fined £30 by means of a fixed penalty notice.

Didcot Power Station lies within the boundaries of Sutton Courtenay Parish and has been much in the news with the announcement that Didcot A will cease operations at the end of March. In due course the cooling towers will be gone which has evoked mixed emotions among local people. The power station has been a landmark for 40 years, has provided a vital energy supply and had a considerable impact on the area. Once voted Britain's third worst eyesore, yet the towers have also inspired artists and photographers during that time.

This illustrated talk by RWEnpower will describe the story of the power station, its influence and significance.

### Oxfordshire WoodfuelProgramme - RikiTherivel

The Oxfordshire WoodfuelProgramme now has a website, <u>www.oxonwoodfuel.org.uk</u>, which provides lots of advice on growing, cutting, storing and burning woodfuel I will be running a series of one-day <u>woodfuel-related study visits</u> on 15 April, 13 May and 8 June. They cost £25 each and more information is available on the website. The Oxfordshire Woodland Project is also running workshops on woodland management: see <u>www.oxfordshire.gov.uk/cms/public-site/woodland-workshops</u>.

I hope to set up some 'logs for labour' matches. If you are a woodland owner who could use some free help with woodland management in return for people taking some firewood (labour for your logs), or are a group of people who would like to work outdoors in return for some firewood (logs for your labour), please get in touch with me. The moisture level of woodfuel is important: a freshly cut log at 50% moisture has only about half the energy content of an equivalent well-seasoned log at 20% moisture. The woodfuelprogramme has a <u>moisture meter</u> that you are welcome to borrow.
