Culham Parish Council Notes for June 2013 - Andrew Steele

From our OCC Councillor – Lorraine Lindsay-Gale

Lorraine's full report will be made available on the village website but the main points are:

- 1) An announcement about a Superfast Broadband supply in Oxfordshire will be made in July. Those lucky enough to have access will get a 20mb/s speed. (CPC put in a special request for Culham as we are on the fringe of the SODC area in an often neglected spot).
- 2) The 2011 2030! Transport plan LPT3 amended document was adopted as policy by Oxfordshire County Council in July 2012. Details on the OCC website.
- 3) The OCC Community Budget consists of £10k per Councillor and the Stewardship Budget consists of £16k per Councillor. The type of expenditure is to be reviewed. (CPC requested monies for the installation of a 'stop' safety gate to be installed outside the double gates of the school on the High Street).
- 4) The Older People's Joint Commissioning Strategy 2013 2016 is under review by NHS, SODC/OCC and older people themselves after the consultation was closed in January 2013.

Next meeting Monday 8th July 2013 at 7:30 pm at the school.

As ever all villagers are welcome to attend - please come along even if you have no specific items to present/discuss.

Talking Point - Revd David Haylett, Associate Vicar

When I was very small, probably only two or three years old, my grandmother gave me a picture with a typical Victorian image of Jesus as the Good Shepherd. A fair skinned, light auburn haired good-looking young man, dressed in an impossibly white robe considering he was carrying a lamb across a field of sheep.

The real Jesus would have been a dark-skinned, dark-haired man, and a real shepherd would be most unlikely to be dressed in a spotlessly clean garment. Sheep are dirty, mucky animals especially when you have to pick them up and carry them around. But such is the fantasy image we create of Jesus the Good Shepherd.

It is amazing how many people in history have been shepherds at one time or another. Saint Cuthbert of Northumbria was a shepherd who looked after his flocks on the Jedburgh hills of Scotland before he responded to the call to serve God. Cuthbert became a great leader of the Church in the North of England.

Moses tended his father-in-law's flocks before becoming a shepherd to the Israelites, leading them through the wilderness from slavery in Egypt to the Promised Land. King David started out life as a shepherd boy and later became King of Israel.

So perhaps it is no surprise that Jesus took the image of a Shepherd as a model for his teaching. It was a model that his contemporaries would understand.

But let us consider the shepherd from the point of the sheep (you and me). Why do sheep need a shepherd?

Firstly for protection. It was the shepherd boy David's skill with a sling and a pebble, long practice at protecting his sheep from marauding wolves and other predators, that enabled him to kill Goliath the Philistine. Sheep also need protecting from themselves. They can be pretty dumb animals, continuously grazing the same area until it becomes bare scrub. They need a shepherd to lead them on to new pastures. If they have a heavy fleece and roll over they are often unable to right themselves and need the shepherd to haul them back onto their feet.

But Jesus points out another danger. There will be others around who will offer their services as a shepherd, but be careful who you choose as your shepherd. Be alert, Jesus warns, you will hear my voice and will follow me. It is easy, too easy perhaps, to be tempted to follow another shepherd, who promises that the grass will be greener on the other side. It always is, until you get there! The voice of Jesus is the only safe voice for sheep to follow.

The words of Psalm 23 are much loved and very helpful. "The Lord is my shepherd, I'll not want, He makes me lie down in green pastures." Jesus is the Good Shepherd who offers the hope that is able to lead us through the valley of the shadow of death.

Jesus says, "My sheep hear my voice. I know them, and they follow me."

Have you signed up to Thames Valley Alert?

Thames Valley Alert is the new system for receiving crime and policing updates for your area. The state-of-the-art system allows anyone who signs up to choose what updates they receive and how they should like to receive it. A new option includes receiving information via text and more traditional landline and email messages will still be available. 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OXFORDSHIRE RURAL COMMUNITY COUNCIL

The Oxfordshire Better Broadband Programme

Within the next few weeks Oxfordshire County Council will be rolling out its £13.86 million Better Broadband programme; all part of the government's ambitions to deliver faster broadband speeds across the country. The council will name its preferred supplier – expected to be BT – who will take responsibility for installing the fibre optic infrastructure which will enable users of superfast broadband to access information, pictures, films and more much faster and more effectively than along the standard copper wires currently used.

According to the council's broadband team, superfast broadband will make speeds in excess of 20Mbps or above available to subscribers in nearly 95 per cent of premises within the county who wish to connect via a service provider. Even the remaining small minority of communities should have access to a minimum service of 2Mbps. It is communities in this 5% which the Rural Community Broadband Fund is designed to help.

Faster broadband is a key issue for rural areas like ours. Increasingly residents of all ages and businesses will need to be able to access a range of services, educational materials and entertainments online through a fast and responsive broadband service. Good broadband capacity is especially important if there multiple users on the premises between them wanting to access a range of different services.

Currently superfast broadband speeds are more often available in urban areas. We don't want our rural communities to lose out and be seen as unsustainable backwaters by anyone who wants to move in, especially if they have a family or run a business.

We understand from Oxfordshire's broadband campaign team that a detailed plan for the superfast broadband roll-out should be available in the autumn with the first cabling taking place in early 2014. Not surprisingly, with such an enormous engineering programme it will take time but is due for completion by late 2015, possibly early 2016.

The burning question, of course, is who will get it and when. That is an answer that only BT will be able to provide in the autumn when it publishes its roll-out plans. The County Council has undertaken to keep us informed as soon as BT's plans become available.

Have your say with your Police and Crime Commissioner

If you are a part of a voluntary or community organisation in the Thames Valley interested in having your voice heard by the Police and Crime Commissioner, Anthony Stansfeld, join the Safer Future Communities (SFC) Network. The SFC Network has been set up to enable voluntary and community groups to engage with the PCC and represent the views of their sector to the PCC. Here are some of the areas of work that organisations that are already part of the Network represent:

Crime and reoffending; anti-social behaviour; violence against women and girls; substance misuse; youth crime; victims of crime and equality and diversity.

As a member of the Network, you will be invited to special Network events to interact with the PCC. In addition, you get information on how to participate in meetings of the Police and Crime Panel (which scrutinises the work of the PCC). The next Safer Future Communities Network event will be in July, where members of the Network will have an opportunity to hear from and speak to the PCC.
