Talking Point by Reverend Caroline King

October is harvest festival time in many of our parishes and despite some wet weather of late it is good to see the harvest being gathered in, fields ploughed and hedgerows rich with berries. At the moment though we have to balance our thanksgiving for a good harvest alongside prayerful awareness of and concern for those for whom daily survival is a constant struggle.

At the moment and largely as a result of the crisis in Syria the whole of Europe is faced with a huge humanitarian crisis as tens of thousands of refugees flee a once prosperous homeland. Through media and over social networks we have seen many heart breaking images of those people forced to flee Syria and the Middle East. Just how desperate must you feel when an overcrowded boat on a stormy sea seems to offer more hope than your homeland?

What can we do to help? It is easy to feel powerless in the face of such desperation. This present crisis is complex and there are no easy answers or solutions. Christian faith is relevant to how we live our lives and we should allow it to inform and shape our society and its structures, lest those whose beliefs lead them towards less tolerant positions end up having the final word. There is a clear bias throughout the whole of scripture towards the weak and vulnerable, from the Book of Leviticus in chapter 19.34: "Treat them as you would a fellow-Israelite, and love them as you love yourselves. Remember that you were once foreigners in the land of Egypt. I am the LORD your God" (GNB), through the prophets and in the life of Jesus. Time and time again in the Gospels Jesus is moved by human need and reacts with love and compassion to heal and restore the broken.

We cannot be indifferent in the face of need; in following Jesus our calling is to be preparers of the way for God's reign, God's kingdom here on earth. Preparation is about making room and clearing space in anticipation of something new. So what can we do to help? As always the public has reacted magnificently to the crisis, there are many Christian charities such as Christian Aid and Tear Fund who are already doing fantastic work. Do support them if you can. There are also charities collecting practical gifts of food, clothing and toys, and taking them to refugees. Above everything else we can commit the current crisis into our prayers. The below prayer comes from the Church of England web site, I commend it to you for both private and public prayer.

Heavenly Father,

You are the source of all goodness, generosity and love. We thank you for opening the hearts of many to those who are fleeing for their lives.

Help us now to open our arms in welcome, and reach out our hands in support. That the desperate may find new hope, and lives torn apart be restored. We ask this in the name of Jesus Christ Your Son, Our Lord, who fled persecution at His birth and at His last triumphed over death. Amen

Church Finances - Andrew Churchill Stone

The PCC of St Paul's is responsible for the running of the church. We are fortunate that we have a thriving Friends' organisation which is responsible for the fabric of the building but the PCC remains responsible for the Insurance, Heating and for paying a contribution towards the Vicar's salary and housing costs. Our total annual expenditure is now £9,000. This is funded by collections and contributions at services and from events like the plant sale. We already have reduced costs as far as we can and our share of the central costs we pay is lower than it might be due to the generosity of other Parishes in the Bridge Group.

For many years the Church has been able to meet these costs from amounts given by current and former parishioners but as people have become older and moved away from Culham this income has fallen. We now face the prospect of losing all of our accumulated funds within the next 18 months.

This has been a good year for the activities of the church and four couples will have been married here this year. If we are to remain available to people who wish to be married here, and to conduct funerals and baptisms, as well as marking the seasons of Harvest, Remembrance, Easter and Christmas we need to remain financially viable. The PCC is now asking those with an interest in seeing the Church remain open and viable to consider a regular donation to its funds to enable its annual costs to be met.

Culham Parish Council (CPC) notes – September 2015

The CPC has been audited and all was well with the paperwork and accounts.

There was one burial in August in the cemetery.

Towards the end of September Councillor Gibbs will attend an OCC event to discuss opportunities to work with Town and Parish Councils across a range of public services.

CPC will chase Morrells for a response to our suggestions about the refurbishment of the Waggon and Horses pub.

The annual ROSPA report on the playing field has listed some medium risk areas which will be attended to.

Quotes will be obtained along with design guidance for the proposed second memorial stone to be placed on the Green.

Councillor Casey-Rerhaye will source the proposed oak tree and hazel tree to replace the trees on the northwest corner of the Green.

A discussion was held on the proposal to produce a Neighbourhood Plan as the next step on from a Community Plan. No final decision was made on this extensive but potentially valuable asset.

County Councillor Report - Cllr Lorraine Lindsay-Gale

Budget

The hard work of preparing a budget for 2016/17 will soon begin in earnest. The exact financial position will not be known until the end of November when the Comprehensive Spending Review is announced; this may mean that the final details of the Budget may not be decided until the January 2016 Cabinet meeting. It is currently expected that around another £60m of savings will have to be made; these will mean some difficult decisions will have to be taken in order to achieve a balanced budget on 16th February 2016. The County Council has already made savings of £204 million since 2010. Further savings of £88 million by 2018 have been planned, so the additional £60m takes the total savings to £352 million. The biggest single budget challenge is the everrising cost of Social Care.

Nearly half of the Council's budget goes on Social Care. By and large, the Council's responsibilities here are statutory, meaning that for the most part, budget cuts fall in other areas.

Household Waste Recycling Centres

A HWRC strategy will aim to create a sustainable network of sites across the county that are well located for areas of population. The network, together with district council kerbside collections, will aim to maximise the amount of waste reused and recycled in the county and minimise the amount of material sent for disposal. An agreed strategy will enable OCC to seek contributions from new development to maintain and improve the HWRC network. In order to achieve a financially sustainable network of sites, it is proposed that the strategy to be consulted on is based on the following key objectives:

- reduce number of sites;
- locate sites to limit as much as possible the drive times for residents;
- locate the sites as close as possible to the more populated centres.

Recycling Road Sweepings

Road sweepings from across Oxfordshire are to be processed at a state-of-the-art new treatment and recovery facility in Ewelme – a move which is designed to boost recycling rates and help cut costs for Oxfordshire County commercial outsourcing, the expectation is that all partners (including OCC) will collaborate and work together for the good of the partnership. OCC will join the partnership through a joint working agreement, retaining influence on the partnership through an operational forum, which provides a basis for consultation and the exercise of influence in the management of the overall joint working arrangements.

Earth Trust - Gardeners Required

Do you have green fingers? Do you have a little time to spare?

If the answer to these questions is "Yes!" then the Earth Trust would love to hear from you!

Around the Earth Trust Centre in Little Wittenham there are some gardens in need of attention. The area includes fruit bushes, five beds of shrubs and ground cover plants, low box hedges, two herb beds, and three climbing plants. There are also some less formal areas used by school groups: an orchard, wild play area, wildlife pond and living willow structures, plus native hedgerows.

"Whilst it's great to leave some areas of your garden to grow wild, to benefit local wildlife, some plants require a bit more care, so we're looking for green fingered volunteers to help us maintain and develop these gardens and other areas. We'll provide support, tools, gloves and other safety equipment when necessary, as well as the all-important tea, coffee and biscuits. Ideas for new plantings and other improvements would be welcomed so there is a real opportunity for someone to put their own stamp on it," said Jez Elkin, Volunteer Engagement Officer at the Earth Trust.

Much of the work is dependent on the time of year but the Trust could easily accommodate a couple of volunteer gardeners one or two days a week.
