Talking Point – Jennifer Morton

A recent episode of 'Escape to the Country' featured Oxfordshire and the escapees wanted to move further west out of London to avoid the traffic in St Albans where they

currently lived. Had they, I wondered, ever been to visit this county during the rush hour when the roads to and from work and school are very congested. Those who live in Nuneham Courtenay or Clifton Hampden can testify to that. The other main impetuous to move away from the sprawl of urban areas always seem to be the desire for peace and quiet. Those of us who live in South Oxfordshire are lucky enough to enjoy the peace of the countryside that surround our villages, however I won't say quiet, because even away from the road and traffic noise the countryside is anything but. If we listen we can hear the birds, maybe a fox or the deer, or as I heard the other night the heavy breathing of the horses in the field next door. But are there other sounds we should be listening out for?

It is all too easy in our communities, when our lives are busy, to miss hearing when our neighbours are in need of a listening ear. We can become complacent that the small community spirit will prevail and assume everyone has regular contact with someone. However, for those who have difficulty leaving their home for whatever reason, isolation can become more and more of a problem. As someone who lives alone, I know that I can go a whole day without speaking to another person. Then could it become two, then maybe a whole week or more....?

Loneliness is one of the main social ills of our time but, in our communities, we are fortunate that for those who are able to get out of the house there many opportunities to get together with others, at coffee mornings, lunch clubs, with other parents at the school gates, book and other clubs and classes, in Church. This presupposes that there is no difficulty in getting there. We must remember that it is not only the frail and elderly that are so often housebound, but also parents with new babies or young children.

However, over the summer many of these opportunities will not be there to provide a meeting point and it becomes even more difficult not to feel trapped and isolated. Our Churches are one place each week that can offer a welcome and friendship when all else takes a break but even these are not always easy buildings to access or comfortable if they have no facilities, however warm the welcome.

So, as we approach the holiday season when so many of these regular opportunities to get together take a break, can we listen out for those whose voices in our communities we need to hear? What as friends and neighbours can we be doing to make sure that no-one that we know feels abandoned or alone?

Oxfordshire volunteers celebrated

After achieving the £11,000 needed to secure their new workshop premises, Broken Spoken have today announced a new 'stretch target' for their crowdfunder campaign. The new figure of £16,000, an additional £5,000 will pay for a much-needed upgrade of tools and contribute to the expansion of their work making Oxford a safer and more fun place for people of all abilities to cycle.

Supporters who donate to the crowdfunder from today will get the chance to have a tool named after them. They'll be able to put their own name, a friend or loved one, or a chosen moniker and the Broken Spoke team have some predictions as to the outcome.

About Broken Spoke

Established in 2012, Broken Spoke is Oxford's own not-for-profit community enterprise where you can learn how to fix and ride your bike. Broken Spoke's vision is to create an open, inclusive, and sustainable cycling and fixing community. They started by running drop-in and women and transgender sessions in community centres around the city. Over the last 5 years they've have grown so much they now help hundreds of people fix and ride their own cycles every year. www.bsbcoop.org Sam Chappell Co-Director at Broken Spoke said;

"I'm sure there will be a Tooly McToolface in there somewhere! We're overwhelmed with the support we've received so far. The £11,000 really just covers our basic relocation costs. If we reach the stretch target we'll be able to give the workshop a much-needed upgrade. And in all seriousness, putting people's names, or a chosen name on the tools is our way of honouring those everyday heroes who pledge so generously to keep us pedalling."

As well as paying for a tool upgrade, the stretch target will also support the development of some of the work that Broken Spoke has been doing this year including;

- Drop-in DIY workshop sessions where people can learn to fix their own cycles.
- Cycle training, where people can learn to ride their cycles with more confidence and safety.
- Beryl's night, a regular fixing and discussion evening for women, trans and non-binary folk.
- The Claudia Charter for Safer Cycling in Oxford, a collaboration led by Broken Spoke of a number of cycling organisations in reaction to the death of Broken Spoke volunteer Claudia Comberti in May 2017.
- The Festival Women & Bicycles, an annual cycling festival showcasing the wonderful things that women, trans and non-binary folk are doing in the cycling world.
- Build-a-bike classes, 6-week sessions run as part of the Crisis Skylight workshop syllabus for people experiencing homelessness to learn new skills and access cycling.
- Mobile mechanic Dr Bike events for local Oxfordshire communities.

So far the crowdfunder has attracted 267 supporters including the University of Oxford's Environmental Sustainability Team who donated their £500 prize for winning the Love to Ride UniCycle competition to the Broken Spoke crowdfunder. Adam Bows, Sustainable Transport Manager from the Oxford University Environmental Sustainability Team said;

"Broken Spoke Bike Co-op have helped many hundreds of our students and staff over the years with their cycle training and confidence courses. We wish them lots of luck with their move to their new premises" Henry Owen, Project Coordinator at the CAG (Community Action Group) Project said;

"Broken Spoke are an exemplary community resource; affordable and open to all. Their success crowdfunding so far shows how much people value and support them. But it also shows the strength of the community they've developed over the years, nurturing connection and relationships across Oxford." He continued "I'm really excited to see what the new team do with the stretch funding, and I'm excited to name a pump as 'pump up the jam!"

As a final goodbye to their current workshop and a thank you to their supporters, Broken Spoke are hosting some final goodbye drinks on their last day on operation in 42 Pembroke St. The event will take place on Tuesday 19th June, 19:00 - 21:30, open to all. Scams Awareness Month

Scams Awareness Month 2018 is took place through June. We want to help you to identify scams and take action by reporting any suspicious activity! Some of the various Scams are listed below:

• Fraudsters pretending to be from the police cold calling members of the public and telling them that their bank account has been compromised by criminals. The fraudster suggests that the person should transfer their bank balance into a 'safe' police bank account.

• Fraudsters pretending to be from the police attending people's addresses and retrieving the person's card and PIN.

• Members of the public receiving letters on bank headed paper informing them that their account has been the subject of a fraud. The letter advises them to transfer their funds to a 'safe' account and that an official will be in contact to provide them with a new card and PIN.

• Fraudsters contacting members of the public requesting them to cut their cards in half because their account has been compromised. They are then asked to post the cut card to an address where fraudsters simply tape the card together again and can use the details to commit fraud.

• Police advice is that if you receive such a call, end it immediately. If you have elderly or vulnerable family members, friends, or neighbours, let them know about the scam. Please be aware that:

Your bank will never attend your home

• Your bank and/or the police will never collect your bank card

• Your bank and/or the police will never ask for your PIN If you receive this type of call, report it to Action Fraud on 0300 123 2040, or via their website.

In an emergency, dial 999 or 101 non-emergency number.
