On this very special day I think it is also lovely to remember and give thanks for all the women who have nurtured us or influenced the course of our lives. New Vicar appointed!

Licensing of The Reverend Canon Mark Haworth

The Dorchester Team are delighted to announce we have appointed the Reverend Canon Mark Haworth to the Dorchester Team to serve in the Bridge Group of Parishes. The Bishop of Dorchester will License Mark in Dorchester Abbey on **31**st **March 2020 at 7.30pm** and we look forward to seeing many of his new parishioners and members of the Team there to welcome him.

Mark was brought up in Sale, Blackburn and Altrincham, and is an honours-graduate forester from Aberdeen University (1973) where inter alia he was President of the University Forestry Society, played hockey for the university, and sang in the Scottish Episcopalian Cathedral (St Andrew's) Choir when not walking in the Cairngorms and West Highlands. His subsequent 15 year career as a District Officer in the Forestry Commission took him to Peebles, Kendal, Thetford and Ludlow from where he became a Hereford ordinand in 1988. Mark has three children and three grandchildren.

Mark trained for the priesthood at Westcott House, Cambridge, serving his title curacy at Cherry Hinton & Teversham, before becoming Vicar of the Swaffhams & Reach, Rural Dean of Fordham, and Sub-Warden of Readers for the Archdeaconry of Ely, all in the diocese of Ely where he also served on a number of diocesan committees. After a brief spell as School Chaplain at Framlingham College and Brandeston Hall School in Suffolk, he became Bishop's Chaplain at Peterborough, moving then to the diocese of Manchester to become Team Rector of the Pendleton Team Ministry, which then became the Salford All Saints Team Ministry ultimate comprising five churches, where he was also Borough Dean of Salford, again serving on a number of diocesan committees and the Bishops Council.

After 7 years Mark moved to become Vicar of Rochdale, and was Acting Area Dean covering a sabbatical; he was made an Honorary Canon of Manchester Cathedral in 2012 in token of his varied diocesan involvements alongside busy parish and team ministry, which latterly included being Chair of the Manchester Area Royal School of Church Music (RSCM) and continued involvement with Affirming Catholicism and the Society of Catholic Priests. In his nearly 7 years in St Edmundsbury & Ipswich he has been a Rural Dean for nearly 6 years, served on Diocesan Synod, Bishop Council, Safeguarding Panel, RSCM, Diocesan Council for Church Music, and the Diocesan Board of Patronage, Archdeaconry Mission & Pastoral Committee, and was acting Archdeacon of Sudbury covering a sabbatical.

Mark has a real heart for collaborative parish ministry, and teams in particular; he is a member of the Society of the Resurrection at Mirfield, West Yorkshire, and has experience of leading away-days and pilgrimages to holy places within these islands. He considers that he has embraced a wide breadth of worship, spirituality, prayer-life and music in his lay and ordained ministry, and that his faith journey is Christ-centred, Biblically-grounded and pastorally-driven, undergirded by a facility and desire for good administration, prayer and parties! He looks forward very much to working within the Bridge Group and the whole Dorchester Team, its schools, the deanery and the diocese, building on what has gone before, and that which is already in place and flourishing.

Mark continues to sing annually with the Manchester Cathedral Voluntary Choir and will enjoy becoming involved musically in South Oxfordshire. He also particularly enjoys fellwalking and landscape, architecture, concerts, theatre and film; he is also a lifetime supporter of Blackburn Rovers FC (which feeds his love of sacrificial loyalty and sardonic humour). Mark and his third faithful Labrador Honey enjoy local walking and spending time with family and friends, and he also hopes to pick up his racquet-sports more often than has been possible of late.

District Councillor's Report Feb 2020 - Sam Casey-Rerhaye

Firstly apologies for missing reports in December and January, I had to take unscheduled leave, and then had a nasty cough and cold for over two weeks.

Local Plan

As I write, we are waiting for the County Council to debate a motion on whether to accept the responsibility of the emerging Local Plan (eLP2034) if the Minister (Rt Hon Robert Jenrick) offers it to them which he has indicated he is minded to do, stripping it away from the District council. The County Council have been recommended to accept it pending financial arrangements, which could mean SODC are forced to transfer money and officers/resources as well. We have already requested a face to face meeting with the Secretary of State (as has Layla Moran MP in the House of Commons) but have heard nothing. We cannot discuss options and compromises with ourselves! It seems that the Minister is prepared to do the exceptional act of passing the Plan to the County but not that of signing off the funding for the new Thames crossing and fly-over in Didcot and pausing our Growth Deal commitment which would allow us to create a new Plan without affecting others. Thank you for all your efforts in writing to the Minister and copying in your MP. There seems to be little respect from government for the obvious democratic mandate we received, I'm afraid, but there is a determination to force through this plan whatever opposition exists. So much for 'respecting democracy'. I will keep you updated as events happen.

Minerals and Waste Local Plan site allocations consultation

This runs until 4th March if you wish to respond. <u>https://www.oxfordshire.gov.uk/sites/default/files/file/planning-minerals-and-waste/OMWLP_SiteAllocationsFINALPLAN.pdf</u>

The only quarry site in South Oxfordshire to be proposed in this Plan is one in Nuneham Courtenay/Sandford border. This is in the Nuneham park area, a Grade 1 listed building and park and with a Grade 1 listed view which this quarry will interrupt. There are major problems with the site itself – archaeological remains going back to Roman times and earlier, ancient burial sites, and it is also very close to some houses in Lower Farm Road. Of course, the traffic generated could be extremely disruptive to Sandford and Nuneham Courtenay village where the houses do not have foundations. I am working with both parishes to help object to this site which I think is highly unsuitable and could cause permanent damage.

Climate Emergency – One year Work Plan

The newly created Climate Emergency Advisory Committee has recommended a one-year programme of priorities be approved by Council as a start to our aims of becoming a carbon neutral council by 2025 and a carbon neutral district by 2030.

CEAC members went through the programme on how the council might begin to embed sustainability in policies and start some feasibility studies on energy savings in council buildings and leisure centres, including identifying opportunities to introduce solar energy and heat pumps.

The report also looked at how the council could develop a sustainable travel plan for officers and councillors, an action plan to reduce single use plastic and help to promote walking and cycling to reduce vehicle emissions.

Cllr Sue Roberts, Chair of CEAC said, "We've worked hard to produce this one-year programme to help us tackle the climate catastrophe and, if the Council agrees, this programme will kickstart our journey towards becoming a carbon neutral council by 2025 and district by 2030. We are inviting our parish councils and community organisations to get involved and to work with us to help us make a difference at a local level."

Finance

A draft budget for 2020-21 has been presented to Cabinet and Scrutiny. It will be presented to Full Council on Thursday 13th February where there will/will have been (depending when you are reading this) a debate and vote on whether to approve it. There are council tax rises proposed in this budget, a substantial amount of savings identified (partly due to the insourcing of the accounting function from Capita, which has allowed officers to work in much more detail than before- a big advantage) and a plan to work on a longer-term changes in the Council to address the very large deficit which the previous administration created.

I need to emphasise the precarity of local government finances across the country at the moment. We have been waiting for a long-term review of local government finance for a number of years now, and hope this will be a priority with the new government in Westminster. But to share with you something of what other councils are feeling and planning too:

A recent survey of local Councils has found that:

- Nearly all councils (97%) plan to increase council tax in 2020/21, with most (93%) planning to raise it by more than 1.5%
- Nearly all councils (97%) plan to increase fees and charges in 2020/21, with some being forced to raise them 'by the maximum possible amount' (14%)
- Confidence in the sustainability of local government finance remains very low, with three guarters (74%) of councils saying they do not feel confident
- 1 in 10 councils (12%) say they are in danger of being unable to fulfil statutory duties this year and 1 in 7 councils (14%) said they anticipate an increase in judicial challenges to the level of service provision this year We have a created a 5-year plan for addressing the deficit and will be reviewing it at least annually but more often as needs arise. I am glad to say I am confident that it has been thoroughly prepared.

Corporate Plan

Not the most interesting of topics in itself but this is actually the crucial place where we set out our values and priorities as administration. This is different from the Local Plan as it covers everything the District does, not just housing and development. We will complete this by the beginning of the new financial year in April and it will influence (and is already influencing in its draft form) how we focus our work and responsibilities. I will let you know when it is published. Our aims are in line with the climate emergency and the ecological risks we face, including ward councillors and their communities being more involved in day to day decision-making, and finding ways to create real & permanently affordable housing.

Waste Enforcement Efforts

You may have seen recent publicity about fly-tippers being prosecuted by SODC. Now we are launching a new campaign to highlight the anti-social blight of littering. A waste enforcement team will be attending a number of local events to explain the laws around littering and fly-tipping, & to answer questions.

Anti-Idling

The anti-idling campaign is continuing throughout the next few months, with posters distributed widely, adverts placed on petrol pumps and flyers included with Council Tax bills. This is a major initiative to address the problems we have with Air Quality in many of our towns, including Henley, Watlington and Wallingford.

Changes to how SODC will support Neighbourhood Development Plans

At its meeting on 30th January, the Cabinet considered and approved a proposal to change the way the Council supports Neighbourhood Development Plan teams, following changes in the way that central government grants operate. From 1st April 2020, the Council will continue to be responsible for any Referendums or Inspections that are required by law, and will provide a wide range of advice at all stages of the process (including reviews), but will no longer provide grant support.

The background to this decision is that the funding provided by central Government to the district council has changed in the following ways:

- It has reduced by £10,000 per plan.
- In most cases the council only becomes eligible to receive grant funding if a plan successfully reaches the referendum stage rather than at different stages throughout the process.
- Revised arrangements limit the number of claims that can be made in a neighbourhood area when progressing a neighbourhood plan review. Only one claim may be submitted per neighbourhood area in a five-year period. Historically, we have been one of a very limited number of councils that have passed on part of the grant funding we receive from central Government to cover our costs in supporting neighbourhood planning directly to neighbourhood planning groups.

At the same time, the grant support from the government directly to neighbourhood planning groups has increased over the years - it includes up to £17,000 financial support, additional financial support up to £10,000 on a pilot scheme for those seeking to promote affordable housing, and technical support.

Officers will continue to help Neighbourhood Planning groups to identify and apply for alternative grant funding, and will offer expert advice and technical support

County Councillor's Report Feb 2020– Cllr. Lorraine Lindsay-Gale

County Council budget offers Oxfordshire residents new investment in social services, schools and roads

Proposals for an "investment budget" to reduce neglect, ill-health and social isolation will be considered by councillors when Oxfordshire County Council sets its budget on Tuesday 11 February, following resident and business consultation.



The proposals include community support for vulnerable people so they can live independently for longer, and more help for struggling families to reduce the chances of children having to go into care.

Funding for children and adult social services would increase by **£30 million** next year, including an extra £8.1 million from the government. This money is needed to support an increase in adult social care needs for both older and disabled people, as well as the increasing number of child protection cases, which has grown in line with national trends.

The budget proposals also include investment in infrastructure across the county, such as an extra **£50 million** for new and existing schools over ten years. Most of the funding comes from housing developers to meet the need for more pupil places in Oxfordshire.

The county council proposes to spend **£30 million** in 2020/21 from its capital budget on repairs to roads, bridges, drainage and footways across Oxfordshire's towns and villages, with major schemes scheduled in Banbury, Abingdon and Witney.

New funding of **£3 million** per year is proposed to improve local road safety and accessibility, including new pedestrian crossings, improved junctions and better bus stop facilities. These measures are designed to encourage walking and cycling as part of the council's commitment to improving air quality and active lifestyles.

Responding to climate change features prominently across budget proposals, including support for sustainable travel such as improving park and ride services on the A40, and the replacement of over 50,000 streetlights with energy-efficient LEDs. However all budget proposals have to consider the climate change agenda and how the county council will meet its carbon neutral target by 2030.

Go ahead for full business case for project to reduce congestion into and around Oxford

Oxfordshire County Council and Oxford City Council cabinets have approved plans to develop a detailed business case for a project to reduce congestion on routes into and around Oxford, improve air quality and reduce carbon emissions.

The aim of "Connecting Oxford" is to make a real improvement to journey times for commuters, other travellers and quality of life for residents and visitors, including improved air quality.

This will be done by reducing the number of cars travelling into and around the city and encouraging more people to travel by buses, walking and cycling. The business plan was informed by a survey run in autumn 2019 on an outline of possible proposals. Over 3000 responses were received from residents, employers and other major city organisations including the NHS and universities. The plans include:

- Three new bus gates at Worcester Street, Thames Street and St Cross Road/South Parks Road to reduce the number of motor vehicle trips which pass through the city centre
- In the eastern arc of Oxford, an area that covers north, east and south-east Oxford inside the ring road
- A Workplace Parking Levy (WPL) is proposed across the eastern arc,
- Benefits to employers and staff include sustainable travel improvements and parking management; discounts on bus fares, park & ride buses and parking and discounts on bike purchases

Revenue from the WPL will also provide a locally controlled source of funding to be used for new and improved bus services as well as funding for additional Park & Ride capacity and better walking and cycling routes. There will also be a significant and rapid expansion of Controlled Parking Zones (CPZ) across Oxford, including nine new CPZ areas.

Plans to go ahead with the steps included in the study will be open to further input by the public, business, employers and other city organisations to address concerns and technical details. This includes the creation of a 'Connecting Oxford Partnership', involving several employers within the proposed WPL zone, to help shape the proposals.

Further public engagement work will be carried during the rest of 2020, with the next public consultation expected to take place in winter 2020/21.

New community library opens in Barton as part of the County Council's commitment to the service

A new community library has opened in the Barton area of Oxford as part of a community-led project between Oxfordshire County Council, Oxford City Council and the Barton Community Association. The new community library is another sign of Oxfordshire County Council's commitment to its library service, with 44 libraries now serving communities across the county and a home library service supporting those unable to get out to their local branch. Botley Library will also move to a new home in the West Way development in February.

Despite the pressure to make saving across local government, with the support of residents and volunteers, Oxfordshire libraries remain open to serve all and at the heart of their communities.

Experiences of A Litter Crusader by Paul Saunders

You may have seen a bearded man wandering around the Culham locality with a sack and litter picker and discovered that all of the bins were ram-jammed full of rubbish. A litter Crusader was at work - that person was I. I moved into Culham in late November 2019 and started taking daily walks to aid my recovery from a major operation and continuing medical treatment. My enjoyment of the beautiful scenery around Culham was constantly spoilt by my encountering litter, particularly along the footpaths, the river and Sutton Pools. I was astounded at the amount of rubbish, particularly that washed up on the river banks. Having found a broken litter- picker in a bin and repaired it, I began a Litter Crusade. This resulted in my collecting at least 35 sacks of rubbish, discovering some interesting objects and learning about how the river's currents act upon different shaped objects, such as plastic bottles.

I retrieved 10 sacks of plastic bottles from one area of the river bank. Many of them revealed their presence underneath the flattened reeds with a distinctive crunch when walked upon. That they were all in this one location demonstrated how the currents worked on bottles. In another location I found six tennis balls, which demonstrated

how the currents work on a sphere. A mass of fishing line was discovered in another area and so on; therefore, this proved to have been an interesting education into how the river's currents work on different shaped objects, some of which were concerning. I discovered 4 black plastic containers/safe boxes used for the disposal of hypodermic syringes at different locations; other syringes were found not in containers and with needles still intact on the river bank. It's worrying to think of the consequences of children finding such items. On a more pleasant note, a very interesting item I found was a Japanese Codd bottle.

"What cod's wallop is this chap talking about and hasn't he spelt cod with two ds, and do the Japanese really put cod in bottles?" Let me explain: in 1873 a Mr. Codd came up with the idea of the globe stoppered bottle, a bottle that was stoppered, or sealed, by the pressure of the carbonated/fizzy drink contained within forcing a marble inside upon a rubber seal near to the top of the neck of the bottle. To open a globe stoppered bottle, so to speak, you would push down on the marble resulting in the pressure being

released and the marble sinking down into the bottle. To prevent the marble rolling back towards the neck and obstructing it when taking a drink, or pouring from the bottle, the bottle was pinched, or squidged, below the neck during manufacture, forming lugs on the inside, which trapped the marble and created a distinctive shape to the bottle, a shape not unlike a fish, a head, gills and body. I had always believed that the bottles were named "Cod" bottles because of their fish like appearance until I discovered that their name is that of their inventor when I researched the history of an antique British Codd bottle that I had found at a car-boot sale and which has embossed on it Jones' Bros, Oxford. I also discovered that bottles of this type were still being produced in Japan so imagine my surprise and delight at finding one of these unique Japanese Codd bottles on the river bank at Culham and which now makes a perfect companion to my British Codd bottle- if only that Japanese Codd bottle could talk....
