Talking point by Rev Teresa Stewart Sykes and the Dorchester Team Clergy

June this year is a month for celebrations, it is the month in which we celebrate the Platinum Jubilee of Queen Elizabeth II, a time for street parties, music events, fireworks and flotillas on the Thames!



Underlying all of these joyous celebrations is an acknowledgement of the Queen's lifelong dedication to our nation and to the Commonwealth of Nations. In a speech for the occasion of her 21st birthday, the Queen set a benchmark for the next 75 years of her committed service, she said: "I declare before you all that my whole life whether it be long or short shall be devoted to your service and the service of our great imperial family to which we all belong.

But I shall not have strength to carry out this resolution alone unless you join in it with me, as I now invite you to do: I know that your support will be unfailingly given. God help me to make good my vow, and God bless all of you who are willing to share in it."

As I read these words, and as I look forward to the Jubilee celebrations, I am reminded of the huge benefit we all enjoy from our village community. The sense of collective endeavour and the success we achieve when we work together; the awareness that we are not alone but live alongside those who wish us well; the simple enjoyment we have in each other's company, whether that is on the cricket pitch, down the pub, or as we pass one another and stop for a chat on the many and beautiful pathways around the village.

I am also reminded of the biblical meaning of a 'Jubilee' year, as laid out in Leviticus 25; a year when everyone was released from their debts, slaves were given their freedom, and land was returned its owner. A Jubilee year is concerned with social relationship, economic security, stability and the wellbeing of the community; it aims to seek to ensure that people live in ways that reflect good relationships with God, with each other, and with creation.

Whatever you are doing in this month of Jubilee, I hope you will find yourselves feeling blessed by your village community and encouraged, like the Queen, to give a little back. In the difficult months ahead as we face a deepening of the cost of living crisis, there may be many who will need a helping hand and all the love and support of our community.





A Platinum Jubilee celebration will be run by the Kids Club of the church. There will be a bar on Friday 3rd June and a street party on 5th June. CPC agreed a donation of £108 for the toilet block.

Permission for the replacement of the war memorial has been granted by the church. Quotes for the work are being sought and it will be completed by November 2022.

A 'thank you' card from the family of Paul Morgan the postman was read out by Caroline Baird. A memorial bench will be installed at Oxford City Golf Club in his memory.

Orchard site and the Green

A plan for the orchard agreement was presented. CPC will go back to Morrell's with a counter offer on the proposal.

Nothing has been heard from SODC.

The group has asked for more information on the traffic modelling, relative to environmental and ecological concerns. CPC is happy with the recent Joint Council agreement.

Culham Parish Council (CPC) notes – May 2022.

Held in St Paul's Church.

The reports from OCC and SODC councillors should appear elsewhere in the Mouthpiece and on the CPC website.

The spoil heap at the side of the road leading to the hydro scheme is being 'griddled' to remove useful material for road repair.

Morrell's will attempt to grow grass along the middle of the roadway by removing some material there, and placing soil and grass seed. However, they said CPC should apply to SODC for an enforcement notice to ensure compliance with the original planning regulation.

The rubbish pile on the playing field will be sorted by a group of volunteers with a view to removing it completely.

Orchard site and the Green

The grant for the Jubilee Tree needs to be applied for.

HIF road update from the Parish group

OCC have gone back to Govt concerning the increased costs and request for a longer time scale.

First Consultation for the Joint Local Plan

Councils have to renew their local development plans every 5 years at least. At South Oxfordshire we have decided to work on a joint one with Vale of the White Horse.

The first consultation is to ask you about what issues are important to you regarding development and other themes that the local plan should tackle. Please note that the law does not allow us to take out sites for development that have been put in previous plans.

The way we have designed this consultation is, I think, much more engaging and easy to understand than before, so please do take a look and give us your views.

Homes for Ukraine

While we still have limited government guidance in some areas, in particular around grant payments, all partners across the county are working together to find solutions and put guests at the heart of any action required. The accommodation and safeguarding checks are progressing well, with the backlog of home checks almost completed, and with no significant concerns raised this week. The £200 payments to our guests to help them with immediate costs while they settle in are being made by whoever makes the first physical contact with them as part of these checks.

We have been doing with Asylum Welcome to develop a proposal to expand the community liaison officer resource available in each district and the city. The purpose would be for this resource to coordinate, advise and refer guests to the support that is available to them, including across housing, education and health. This has now been agreed and recruitment to these posts has begun. When recruited the roles will be based within our community support hub.

Jubilee Grants

We have decided that instead of giving grants for Jubilee celebrations, we will give them for tree planting in the District. This is to support the Queen's Green Canopy, <u>The Queen's Green Canopy</u> (<u>queensgreencanopy.org</u>) and our own Corporate Plan objectives of enhancing nature and tackling the climate emergency. I will let you know how to apply as soon as this is arranged but it will be in time for the tree planting season this winter.

No Mow May

In addition to existing wildflower meadows, next month both councils will trial leaving additional areas of land uncut for No Mow May, a national campaign aiming to let grass grow long to help boost biodiversity. At the end of the month, people are asked to take part in Every Flower Counts:

Council Tax Rebate

Oxfordshire Climate Change survey

The county council is running a survey to discover people's understanding of and opinions about climate change across Oxfordshire. This is part of a countywide project we're involved in to increase understanding of the impact of climate change and inspire behaviour change.

Homes for Ukraine

The system is in full swing across Oxfordshire to support the government's Homes for Ukraine scheme. While we still have limited government guidance in some areas, in particular around grant payments, all partners across the county are working together to find solutions and put guests at the heart of any action required. The accommodation and safeguarding checks are progressing well, with the backlog of home checks almost completed, and with no significant concerns raised this week.

As previously mentioned, the £200 payments to our guests to help them with immediate costs while they settle in are being made by whoever makes the first physical contact with them as part of these checks. This week, we have worked to agree that moving forward we will usually issue this payment as a pre-loaded card rather than cash, which can be used online, in shops or at a cashpoint, just like a normal debit card. We are offering our guests a choice, so if they would prefer to receive this payment as cash, they are invited to let us know.

OCC have been working with Asylum Welcome to develop a proposal to expand the community liaison officer resource available in each district and the city. The purpose would be for this resource to coordinate, advise and refer guests to the support that is available to them, including across housing, education and health. This has now been agreed and recruitment to these posts has begun. OCC have continued to process school place applications and are also recruiting an additional admissions officer to manage demand and avoid administrative delays.

You may have seen that the Department for Work and Pensions has laid emergency regulations so those arriving in the UK from Ukraine, as a result of the Russian invasion, can access Universal Credit and jobs support immediately. Families can therefore claim for free school meals in the usual way under the usual eligibility criteria, which requires providing a national insurance number. To reassure councillors, in Oxfordshire, we are asking all schools to provide free school meals where appropriate and not wait to receive a national insurance number. We will continue to put the needs of children first.

Gifts for Ukrainian children and donated 4x4 from the County Fire Service

Thanks to the kindness and generosity of our fire and rescue colleagues, hundreds of teddies are on their way to Fire Aid to be given to Ukrainian children escaping the horrors of war in their country. The donations were collected by our teams at Didcot, Wheatley, Thame, Slade, Rewley Road, Faringdon, Burford, Bicester, Banbury, Kidlington, Deddington and Chipping Norton. We've also donated a decommissioned 4 x 4 vehicle that is currently on its way to support people in Ukraine. While it's still road-worthy, we've replaced the vehicle with a newer model and it's no longer needed by our fire and rescue service. Normally we auction used vehicles when they're replaced but this time we've donated it to support such an important cause.

New County council policy on Tree Planting

A change in approach will help increase the number of trees in Oxfordshire after a new policy was approved. It will put the emphasis on a 'presumption in favour of trees' because of the host of benefits they provide to the climate, the environment and the places where people live.

We want to move away from simply maintaining and managing the trees on our land to actively encouraging and enabling more trees to be planted in both rural and urban settings. This can help tackle climate change and increase resilience to it, as well as improving people's quality of life – both now and in the future.

One requirement of the policy is to plant two new trees for every tree that has to be removed from county council land. It also promises to explore new tree planting opportunities and extra investment to carry it out, stricter guidelines for those wanting to remove existing trees and implement proactive care to prolong the lives of established trees.

The main climate benefits of trees, due to their ability to mitigate extremes of heat, cold, wind, rain, and drought, include:

- removing and storing carbon from the air
- reducing urban temperatures through canopy cover
- preventing flooding by reducing the pressure on drainage systems
- wind speed reduction
- cutting air pollution
- enhancing biodiversity
- supporting sustainable agriculture.

Their presence has also been shown to contribute directly to improved wellbeing and mental health, enhance street design and even reduce crime. Research has shown that public open space with trees tends to be used more than space without trees and this increases casual surveillance – deterring criminal activity.

The new policy will not compromise the council's ability to deal with trees which pose a danger to the public or to property.

The scope, scale, and business case for direct investment into a tree planting programme will be considered as the next step for key consideration as part of the 2023/24 annual budget setting process. Money to fund tree planting would also be sought from numerous national grants, sponsorship, carbon offsetting by businesses and developer contributions.

Climate Action Study and online tool

We're working with our council partners across Oxfordshire to develop an online tool to help people take action against climate change in their own lives. The suggestions provided will be tailored to the lifestyle of individuals to make sure they're relevant (for example, only suggesting ideas to reduce car journeys for those people who have a car) with the aim to reduce residents' carbon emissions. 






Children and Military Lives Exhibition - Stories of Adventure, Family, and Exile

- Exhibition running from 2 June to 24 November 2022 at Soldiers of Oxfordshire Museum, Woodstock
- Explores the experience of children of serving military personnel and also children who have been affected by conflict, historically and contemporarily.
- Collaboration between charities Soldiers of Oxfordshire Trust, War Toys, and Little Troopers.
- Combines objects, personal stories, oral histories, art and photography.





With a focus on Oxfordshire people, our visitors can see and hear what living through conflict is like first hand, from recordings of evacuation memories to present day accounts from children who arrive in the county and experience a new culture here, processing their life experiences through art and personal stories.

To bring this exhibition to visitors, Soldiers of Oxfordshire Museum have partnered with two charities, Little Troopers and Brian McCarty's War Toys.

Little Troopers, a charity which supports all children who have parents serving in the British Armed Forces, will give visitors the opportunity to discover the stories and experiences of military children who have grown-up in the Armed Forces community. Explore how they cope with having their parents deployed overseas to different parts of the world; how they move house and school regularly, building friendships for what can be short periods of time and read and listen to their own reflections on what it's like to have military parents as these young people start to consider their own adult lives.

Louise Fetigan, founder of Little Troopers, comments: "There are more than 100,000 children today who have parents serving in the British Armed Forces so it's really important that we represent these children and give them the opportunity to tell their story and to share their unique experiences. Military life is full of challenge, change and adventure and this exhibit offers visitors a special insight into our Armed Forces community as seen through the eyes of military children."

SOFO Museum has also collected accounts from children of the 1950s to 2000s, whose parents were part of the British forces. Frequently these children experienced traveling across the globe following in their father's footsteps; often giving them unique life experiences they never forgot.

Also included in the exhibition, the unique photo series *War Toys* vividly brings to life the effects of war on children living in conflict zones around the world. Acting as their own art directors, children often living in refugee camps are given the opportunity to depict real scenes from their experiences using toys and the local terrain. The resulting images are impactful and thought provoking; giving us an insight into a world which is far removed from our experiences of watching news programmes covering the camps in war zones.

The exhibition will not only run throughout both Armed Forces Day and Refugee Week, but also the Queen's Platinum Jubilee. To mark the Jubilee, SOFO Museum will highlight the Queen's own 'military childhood' and her Second World War service in the ATS (Auxiliary Territorial Service) with a timeline of the nation's toys and books. We have gathered toys from the 1940s to the present day as we take a look at our enduring relationship with toys that depict war, from tin soldiers of yesterday to remote control drones of today.
