From Rev. Caroline King and the Dorchester Abbey Team

I am writing this immediately after the Platinum Jubilee weekend. There was real and obvious affection for the Queen. Sustained by her Christian faith, she has served with

grace, dignity and a clear sense of service rooted in duty to God and neighbour. The celebrations led to a real coming together of our communities in a wonderfully inclusive way. My one regret is that I have not yet had opportunity to try the Jubilee trifle (but perhaps there is still time).

For me, a real highlight of the national celebrations was the moment the Queen had tea with Paddington Bear and we learned what she keeps in her handbag - a marmalade sandwich! It was just the most wonderfully innocent joy-filled moment, giving us all a glimpse of the Queen's sense of humour, but it was also a moment of great profundity.

Children's literature often expresses great truths in an accessible and non-threatening way. Paddington Bear is no different. Through the books and the lovely animated films Paddington has much to say to us

about the importance of welcome to those who need to hear that they are welcome, loved and a part of our communities.

'Long ago, people in England sent their children by train with labels around their necks, so they could be taken care of by complete strangers in the countryside where it was safe. They will not have forgotten how to treat strangers.' Aunt Lucy in Paddington Bear.

Paddington Bear was an illegal immigrant, who made his home amidst a pretty traditional strait-laced family and as a result enrichened their lives in a transformative and wonderful way. Aunt Lucy makes this point beautifully. The quote says something important about our compassion and tolerance as a nation; I'm sure it still rings true today.

I know that our communities will offer a big affirming welcome to those settling here, especially to Ukrainians, Afghans and anyone fleeing their homes. Speaking up for the dispossessed is at the heart of the Bible as is the offering of hospitality. In Matthew 25.40 we read 'Truly I tell you, just as you did it to one of the least of these brothers and sisters of mine, you did it to me.' In the Old Testament, God's people are commanded: 'Don't mistreat any foreigners who live in your land. Instead, treat them as well as you treat citizens and love them as much as you love yourself. Remember, you were once foreigners in the land of Egypt. I am the Lord your God' (Leviticus 19.33-34).

The Queen's choice of Paddington seems poignant and profoundly Christian especially because once again many in our villages are opening their hearts and homes to welcome people fleeing Afghanistan and Ukraine. Many more are helping to support them in any way they can. As communities it is wonderful that we can offer welcome and refuge to those fleeing the devastation of war. The Platinum Jubilee has highlighted that modern Britain is a dynamic and diverse place. My hope and prayer is that our communities continue to come together and offer friendship and welcome to all.


ABBEY CONCERT MANAGERS REQUIRED ARE YOU INTERESTED?

Culham Parish Council (CPC) notes – June 2022

The Annual Parish Meeting

Held at the church.

Philip Owen was voted in as Chair, and took over from Sam Casey-Rerhaye for the remainder of the meeting. He will remain as chair until the Parish Council elections in 2023

Public Participation

There is the potential for a group of people to set up community speedwatch group with a mobile camera. Chris Pritchard agreed to lead.

The haul road to the hydro scheme has had soil placed along its central section and has been seeded with grass. It was stated that his is as much as Morrells can do. Some of the stone remaining to the south of the road, close to the Donkey Bridge will be used in the future. The rest has buried and re-seeded.

The orchard's proposed 25 year lease has been queried by CPC who would like to negotiate the length of the lease to 99 years – Currently only options of a further 25 year lease is being offered. If the orchard was elsewhere, the longevity of the lease could be agreed at 99 years. – John Taylor will find out if another location would in fact come with a longer lease.

<u>Grass cutting</u> – trimming of the bus stops is on the list to be done – North side has been cut. The general village cut has been delayed and is overdue.

The remainder of the meeting was to deal with Parich Council paperwork. A date for the Annual Parish Meeting in May 2023 was agreed for Tuesday 9th May, venue to be agreed.

Joint Local Plan 2041

Councillor Community Grant

Round one of the 2022/23 councillor community grant scheme is now open until midday on 2 September. Grants of up to £5,000 per councillor can be awarded to town and parish councils and 'not for profit' groups. Decisions may be made collectively in wards with multiple councillors. June is Pride month, and the District Council will be celebrating in several ways. We'll be raising the Pride flag outside Abbey House and Milton Park through the month, to celebrate and show our support for the LGBTQ+ community across the districts.

Boiler Upgrade Scheme opens

As you know, changing how we heat and insulate our homes is a very important priority for me and my fellow councillors, and of course it is particularly important now with huge hikes in the cost of energy. The Leader of the District Council, Cllr David Rouane, has written to the government calling for a strategy for mass-retrofitting of homes – the second letter the Council has written to the government on this. He has said that any plan should empower local authorise and ensure constant and long-term funding to ensure they can make sustained, significant progress in reducing greenhouse gas emissions from residential properties. There is a new scheme just announced by the government:

The Boiler Upgrade Scheme which is to help improve the energy efficiency of homes, reduce energy bills and cut emissions in the long-term. The scheme is now open for people to apply for the following support when replacing their oil or gas boilers:

- £5,000 off the cost and installation of an air source heat pump
- £5,000 off the cost and installation of a biomass boiler
- £6,000 off the cost and installation of a ground source heat pump

New countywide food strategy

We have worked in partnership with other Councils, community groups, and Oxfordshire County Council to help them implement a new food strategy. The proposed strategy aims to make food in the county more affordable, resilient and sustainable. Winners of NatureSpace Consistency Award

Good news for the Planning team who have won a Consistency Award in the 2022 NatureSpace Annual Awards! Out of the 50 local authorities participating, the South and Vale joint award is one of only three council awards in England to receive it. The team were awarded for their professional approach to provide information on how to create high-quality habitats for great crested newts when dealing with planning applications and developments

County Councillor's Report June 2022– Robin Bennett

£10.4 million awarded for active travel improvements in Oxfordshire

Cyclists, pedestrians and residents in Oxfordshire will benefit from a £10.4 million government grant to improve walking and cycling infrastructure in the county.

Oxfordshire County Council has been awarded funding from the third phase of the government's active travel fund. The council has previously been awarded grants of £600,000 from phase one and £2.98m from phase two, so this new round is a step change in magnitude.

The funding will support infrastructure improvements across the county including £400K for feasibility work on the Berinsfield-Oxford link and £237,500 for the School Streets programme.

Celebrating the official opening of our new library service

Our library teams recently celebrated the official opening of the <u>new Business and Intellectual Property Centre</u>. Based on the second floor of our county library in Oxford, the centre supports individuals and entrepreneurs to start and grow their own business. Developing multi-purpose physical spaces for people to access a range of services is part of our innovative new <u>library and heritage strategy</u>.

Action to tackle climate change in Oxfordshire

Oxfordshire County Council's Cabinet has approved plans which could see its own carbon emissions almost halved by 2024/25.

The authority produced 10,774 tonnes of CO2 in 2020/21, but measures outlined in its carbon management plan could see this cut to 6,000 tonnes within three years.

The climate action plan for 2022/23 was also approved, aiming to help Oxfordshire as a county get to 'net zero' ahead of the national target of 2050. Ways in which the council is helping Oxfordshire tackle climate change include:

- Shaping our transport system through the new Local Transport and Connectivity Plan.
- Investing in public transport to bring 159 electric buses to Oxfordshire.
- Installing EV charging points in council car parks for those without off-road parking.
- Piloting a zero emissions zone in Oxford city centre.
- Supporting more than 100 community-led climate action groups, the largest network of its kind in the UK.
- Helping residents recycle and compost 59.5 per cent of all household waste top place in England for eight years in a row.
- Trialling hydrogen technology to power fire engines.
- Partnering with councils, universities, community, and private sector to create a smart clean energy system through <u>Local Energy Oxfordshire</u>.

Another key tool in the council's plans is the <u>Pathways to a Zero Carbon Oxford</u> (PAZCO) report, which was jointly funded by the council, alongside partners in local government, academia, and business, to outline different potential pathways to achieving a zero-carbon economy in Oxfordshire by 2050, with milestones for 2030.

HIF1 Didcot and Culham infrastructure project

I'm continuing to participate in the 'cabinet advisory group' for the project. We've made clear we do not want an 'Expressway by stealth' pushing heavy traffic onto our unsuitable country roads, and we don't want to lock in car-dependent sprawl in new developments. We are also looking at design improvements to cut the carbon and other pollution impacts of the project, and making sure that walking and cycling routes connect and link to other forms of transport. What change we can actually secure, given how far along the project is, remains to be seen.
