


Take a moment on Remembrance Day to think of all those who have died in wars.

Talking point by Revd Jennifer Morton

Someone once said to me that November was a difficult month for her. All the important anniversaries in her life seemed to be during this month. The happy and sad memories, the poignant and with that a sense of loss. As we get older I am sure that we all have times of the year when special memories are sharper.



However, November is also a particular time of the year for remembering within our communities. First at the beginning of the month our church communities remember the lives of the many saints that have been examples of faith throughout the centuries. Next there is the opportunity to remember those more personal to us whom we have lost, especially those who have died recently but not exclusively. Many of our churches hold special services when we can name our loved ones and light a candle. 

Interested in birds and birdwatching? The RSPB Vale of White Horse Local Group holds monthly talks from September to May at the River Room (by the Church), Sutton Courtenay and / or via Zoom in the darker months, on Mondays starting at 7.30 pm and finishing by 10pm. We also meet monthly at local birdwatching sites.

Our next talks are:

20 November 2023 (hybrid - attend in person at the River Room or via Zoom): David Boag: The World of a Wildlife Photographer

David is an author and wildlife photographer who regularly lectures to groups and on cruise ships, and has spoken at RSPB and British Trust for Ornithology (BTO) conferences. Nicholas has farmed at Vine House Farm since 1964. He was awarded an MBE for services to farming and conservation in 2006, and regularly collaborates with RSPB and BTO on conservation projects. The farm supplies bird seed to conservation organisations including the Wildlife Trusts.

26th November 2023: Farmoor, meet 10am on site

In October we welcomed Michael Leach to the River Room, who gave us a talk based on his book "The Complete Owl". Michael covered barn owls, tawny owls, little owls and cat owls, discussing the specialised techniques that help them hunt. He also dispelled some owl myths, and revealed what an owl's life is really like. A highlight was the dramatic high speed photographs of owls in flight. Also in October we met at Little Wittenham, walking from Days Lock we looked for birds along the River Thames and in the scrapes created by the Earth Trust as part of the "River of Life" project.

As every drama student knows "Yes and....' is one of the famous rules of "improv" or improvisation and taught in drama classes throughout the world. "Yes and..." means develop and keep the scene going!

Improvisational techniques are used extensively to train actors for stage, film and television and can be an important part of the rehearsal process and it is an integral part of **Abingdon Drama Club's junior drama classes** curriculum - classes that have been going for over 40 years.

These classes produce amazing young actors with some even going on to perform in the West End theatre and on TV and in mainstream films. We even have ex pupils becoming drama teachers!

The classes offer young aspiring actors a chance to hone their acting skills in a fun, nurturing environment while meeting other young people from a variety of local schools. This nurturing and empathetic learning space, part of ADC's community ethos, is further enhanced by the fact that their present teacher, Leon Witcomb, (who had his own one man show at the Edinburgh Fringe this year), was once one of the pupils!

New Oxfordshire Gallantry Board to commemorate the county's military and civilian heroes

- New permanent exhibition opening 22 October 2023
- Commemorates people of Oxfordshire awarded the country's highest awards for gallantry
- Stories of heroism from the Victorian era to the last decade told

On 22 October 2023 Soldiers of Oxfordshire Museum (SOFO) in Woodstock will unveil a new display to celebrate some of the county's most remarkable heroes - the 31 men who have been awarded the Victoria Cross, the George Cross, or the Edward and Albert medals that preceded its institution.

The Victoria Cross was instituted by the Queen in 1856 to recognise exceptional acts of valour in the presence of the enemy, and was open to all ranks of the military.

All those recognised on the museum's board are individuals who have close and enduring links to Oxfordshire.

10 Oxfordshire men were awarded the VC prior to 1914, in campaigns ranging from the Crimean War to the Boer War.

6 more VCs were awarded to county men during the Great War.

The George Cross and the George Medal were both instituted in September 1940 by King George VI for "acts of the greatest heroism or of the most conspicuous courage in circumstances of the most extreme danger". It would supersede the Empire Gallantry Medal, and by 1971, replace the Albert and Edward Medals. The Albert Medal was instituted in 1866, awarded for saving lives at sea, while the Edward Medal was instituted in 1907. Originally awarded solely for bravery amongst miners and quarrymen, it was extended to farm and industrial workers.

The county's Second World War Victoria Cross and George Cross recipients cover both civilian acts of bravery and all branches of the armed forces, with three GCs awarded to men in the Royal Navy. Henry James Miller, of Hanborough, died whilst helping to evacuate the crew from his submarine HMS Unity in April 1940 after a night collision with a freighter in the North Sea.

Since the end of the war, five more GCs have been awarded to Oxfordshire men - four of these were based at different times at Vauxhall Barracks in Didcot, the home of the Army's EOD regiment.

This new board in the SOFO museum tells of those Oxfordshire people whose valour on the battlefield, and gallantry in action were formally recognised by their awards - civilians and soldiers alike.
