



## Talking point by Revd Sorrel Shamel-Wood

Easter is a time when we celebrate new life. The shops are filled with displays featuring pastel-coloured

eggs, bouncing lambs and cheeky chicks. The festival coincides with the onset of Springtime, when the

days become longer and brighter and our local farms are bursting with new life. Visiting the lambs is becoming an increasingly popular activity for families, rivalling the pumpkin picking craze that continues to soar in popularity during the October half-term holiday.

Of course, for Christians, Easter is the festival celebrating the resurrection life of Jesus Christ. Christians believe that, on Easter Sunday, Jesus rose from the grave, heralding a great celebration and a promise of new, glorious, eternal life. The image of the rising Sun is symbolic for Christians at this time of year, with many offering a dawn service to celebrate Easter Sunday as the first morning light first creeps up over the hillside. For Christians, this is one of the holiest and most special times of year, and we give thanks to God not just for all created life, but for the particular good news of Jesus.

However, Easter Sunday is the culmination of Holy Week, which is a dramatic and intense journey of intense ups and downs. On Palm Sunday (the Sunday before Easter), Jesus was celebrated by the crowds as a hero when he rides into Jerusalem on a donkey. On Maundy Thursday, he shared a final meal with his closest friends before being betrayed by them. On Good Friday, he was crucified. On Holy Saturday, nothing happened: Jesus lay dead in the grave and his friends hid in fear, thinking that was the end of the story.

In the run up to the glorious celebration of resurrection life, there are many moments of despair, death and darkness. We know this to be true in the natural world as well: before Spring time bursts out in all its beauty and colour, first the Autumn leaves must die and rot into the ground. First we must go through the darkest and coldest time of year, when nothing seems to be growing. We know that death and darkness are part of the cycle of life.

I have found that, depending on where I am in the journey of life, different parts of the Easter story resonate with me in different years. Some years, I am most excited for the joyous celebration of Easter. At other years, it is the profound reality of Good Friday where I feel closest to God. During the lockdown of 2020, I

felt that I was most compelled by Holy Saturday: the day when nothing happened. I wonder which day of

the story most resonates with you this year?

A long and full life, and any great adventure story, is full of moments of excitement and celebration as well

as times of boredom, frustration and grief. pray that wherever you are on life's journey, you would find

comfort, healing, strength and community. Please know that you are very welcome to come and journey

with us as we remember the Easter story, at any or all of our Holy Week services across the Dorchester

Team this year. Or if you are too frail but would like a pastoral visit or to receive communion, please do get

in touch.

### District Councillor Report February 2024 - Sam Casey-Rerhaye

#### The next Joint Local Plan – consultation and low carbon housing

Planning is a key statutory responsibility for the district council and one of the main ways we can deliver on our priorities on climate change, nature and biodiversity, truly affordable housing and provision of new infrastructure.

The Government's climate change adviser, the Committee on Climate Change, has assessed that all new buildings must be "zero-carbon" by 2025 if the UK is to meet its legally binding decarbonisation targets.

In 2015, as part of "cutting the green crap," the government scrapped the zero-carbon homes standard which was due to come into force the following year. As a result, more than a million new homes have been built with poor energy efficiency standards and resulting higher bills.

We managed to ensure South Oxfordshire's existing Local Plan 2035, which passed inspection in 2020, imposes energy efficiency standards that are higher than those required by building regulations.

In December, the government announced its new Future Homes Standard which disappointed many with its lack of ambition. The announcement included a condition that any local planning policy on energy efficiency that goes beyond current or planned building regulations "should be rejected" by planning inspectors unless it is supported by "well-reasoned and robustly costed rationale."

In our Council's draft Joint Local Plan 2041 we have some new policy proposals which include ambitious zero carbon standards for new developments, that go beyond the Future Homes Standard. It will be vital that the Council backs up these policies with robust evidence if they are to pass inspection.

Government are suggesting higher standards will limit the number of new homes built. But both can be achieved. Having high national building standards that align with the climate emergency can provide the homes people need and tackle the climate and cost of living crises. After all, sustainable homes are cheaper to run and less costly for our planet.

The consultation on the preferred options for the Joint Local Plan ran until 11.59pm on 26th February 2024.

#### Spring Clean

We are once again supporting the Keep Britain Tidy 'Great British Spring Clean' with litter pickers, high-viz jackets and bags available for loan to community litter picking groups and individuals, from Friday 15 March to Sunday 31 March.

Equipment is limited and it's first-come-first-served, so bookings should be made as soon as possible by completing and returning the booking form and declaration document available on South's litter picking webpage (search Community Litter Picking on <u>www.southoxon.gov.uk</u>) We must receive completed forms at least two weeks before a litter pick takes place.

#### 'Greening' your business

We're urging local businesses and organisations to take part in a survey to find how best to help them find new markets, make potential cost savings as well as becoming more environmentally-friendly.

### **County Councillor Report February 2024 - Cllr Robin Bennett**

#### OCC budget

Oxfordshire County Council cabinet has proposed measures to close its remaining £900,000 budget shortfall for 2024/25. The proposals form part of the final budget which will be decided at the annual budget setting meeting of all 63 county councillors on 20 February.

Although a track record of responsible financial management means that Oxfordshire County Council has been in a more resilient position than many other authorities, the overall position remains extremely challenging. Councils of all political hues throughout the country have made clear to central government that more funding was needed this year and in following years due to the high levels of pressures in areas such as social care, special educational needs and other services.

While the government has subsequently announced an increase to council funding of a further £600 million nationwide, following warnings of an impending crisis, we won't know how much Oxfordshire will receive or any further details until later this month.

#### Health and Wellbeing Strategy

More than a thousand people in Oxfordshire have helped OCC to prepare a <u>new strategy to improve health</u> <u>outcomes</u> for local people over the next five years. Three new principles for health success lie at the heart of the strategy: addressing health inequalities; preventing ill-health; and closer collaboration. It's been developed by Oxfordshire's Health and Wellbeing Board – the partnership between local NHS services, the county council, the city and district councils and Healthwatch Oxfordshire. This links well to the Community Profile being developed for Berinsfield, which comes with some public health funding.

#### Road safety and Vision Zero

I have met with officers and asked them to investigate ways to improve safety on the A4074 Dorchester bypass with urgency. Further, the county council has written to the Thames Valley Police and Crime Commissioner (TVPCC) to call for more police action to improve road safety, after the number of people killed or seriously injured on Oxfordshire's roads rose in 2022 – the first increase for many years.

Oxfordshire County Council has made a commitment to <u>Vision Zero</u> – the elimination of road deaths and serious injuries by 2050 – and is currently progressing with a strategy and associated action plan to deliver this ambition.

#### Fix My Street changes

Changes have been made to simplify and improve FixMyStreet. This remains the best way to report potholes, faulty streetlights and a host of other street defects and queries.

The updated version also includes an aerial map of the county, as well as a regular map, to help people pinpoint the location of the problem.

The changes will be monitored over the next three months to see what impact they have, and the views of users will be sought.

#### 100 Together conference

Earlier this year, Oxfordshire County Council organised a conference called '100 Together', investigating possibilities for investment needed to deliver environmental activity at scale in Oxfordshire, which featured an opening talk by acclaimed Oxford economist Kate Raworth.

#### Didcot HIF1 planning inquiry

In July 2023, the Secretary of State for Levelling Up, Housing and Communities called in the planning application for the HIF1 Didcot and surrounding areas major infrastructure project, following the county council's planning and regulation committee's vote to refuse the application.

A conjoined planning and Orders public inquiry will take place at <u>Bee House in Milton Park</u>, and will sit for 26 days across a 12-week period.

The sitting dates of the inquiry are:

- 20 to 23 February
- 27 February to 1 March
- 5 to 8 March
- 26 to 28 March
- 16 to 19 April
- 23 to 26 April
- 8 to 10 May (set as reserve days)

Sessions will start at 10am and run until 5pm Monday to Thursday, with finish times at 3pm on Fridays. Members of the public can attend the inquiry.
