Talking point by Revd Sorrel Shamel- Wood

This is a season of big changes in the Dorchester Team, as we say goodbye to Reverend Teresa Stewart-Sykes (team vicar of Berinsfield, Drayton St Leonard, Nuneham Courtenay and the Baldons) and Reverend Caroline King (team vicar of Warborough, Newington, Chislehampton and Stadhampton). Reverend Teresa is moving to take on a house for duty post in Dorset and Reverend Caroline is retiring.



Our two curates, Reverend Catherine Schneider and Reverend Sorrel Shamel-Wood are also moving to pastures new: Reverend Catherine will be becoming the Priest-in-

Charge of Kingston Bagpuize with Southmoor and Reverend Sorrel will be leaving the team to have a baby before taking on the role of Children, Schools and Family Chaplain at the University Church of St Mary the Virgin in the New Year. Curates are training posts in the Church of England: after ordination, curates usually stay at their curacy churches (or title posts) for three or four years before moving on to their own parishes. As well as departures, there will be arrivals! The Dorchester Team has welcomed many curates over the years and this year we will be welcoming Emma Firth as our new curate. Emma trained at Ripon College Cuddesdon and is already well known across the Dorchester Team as she has been serving on placement with us for the last few years. Emma is particularly well known at St John the Baptist, Stadhampton where she leads the monthly family service and at Dorchester Abbey. So, it will be lovely to have a familiar face around as she steps into her new role as an ordained minister. Reverend Canon Rachel Carnegie will be continuing as an associate priest at the abbey, but will also be taking on a new role as chaplain at All Souls College, Oxford

Across our parishes, many others will be facing both big and small changes as families and individuals. Some people will be moving house, either within the Dorchester Team or perhaps moving into the parishes from farther afield. If you are new to the area, then welcome! We hope you are settling into your new home and we look forward to meeting you soon.

Some families will be passing the summer holiday with a mixture of excitement and perhaps also trepidation as a child prepares to start primary school for the first time, or moves on from one of our village primary schools to the new challenge of secondary school. Some people will be preparing to get married, and summer is always a lovely and busy time for weddings across our team churches. Other people may be retiring or starting a new job, or preparing to move to university. We will also all be heading to the ballot box on July 4th, some people hoping for a change of government and others voting for the current government to remain. Many other countries around the world are also holding general elections this year, 2024 being notable for a particularly high number: 64 countries, representing nearly half of the world's population, with two billion people worldwide being eligible to vote in them.

Change is, ironically, one of the only constants in life. There are the regular rhythmic changes we come to expect, such as the turning of the seasons and watching children grow older, but there can also be unexpected changes. Some change is exciting and welcome, other changes can be unwelcome or even traumatic. The book of Ecclesiastes in the bible is a popular choice at funerals, and it takes a philosophical approach to the many changes we experience in life. The speaker, traditionally thought to be King Solomon, states:

For everything there is a season and a time for every matter under heaven: a time to be born and a time to die; a time to plant and a time to pluck up what is planted; a time to kill and a time to heal; a time to break down and a time to build up; a time to weep and a time to laugh; a time to mourn and a time to dance; a time to throw away stones and a time to gather stones together; a time to embrace and a time to refrain from embracing; a time to seek and a time to lose; a time to keep and a time to throw away; a time to tear and a time to sew; a time to keep silent and a time to speak; a time to love and a time to hate; a time for war and a time for peace (Ecclesiastes 3:1-8 NRSV).

Elsewhere, the bible has many different things to say about change. In the book of Hebrews, from the New Testament, it states "Jesus Christ is the same: yesterday, today and forever" (13:8). Throughout the centuries, this verse has provided comfort to Christians who find strength in the knowledge that even as the world changes around them, God does not. The bible uses many metaphors to describe the steadfastness of God, including an anchor, solid rock and foundation.

If you are a praying person, please do pray for the Dorchester Team as we undergo these big changes this summer, especially for our Team Rector, Reverend Jane Willis as she continues to steer the ship! Or if not, then please do hold us all in your thoughts. And please be assured of our continued prayers, wherever life is taking you this summer.


Culham Chat - The main general group for All Culham Residents

Brief Notes from Culham Parish Council meeting 10 April 2024

- General Election information poster is on public noticeboards and also on PC website.
- Sam Casey-Rerhaye is now on SODC cabinet and will be involved with corporate services and the strategic plan.
- 75K capital funding available, applications close on 1st July midday Rural England Prosperity Fund. This provides grants for local businesses or community purposes.
- Clerk's report internal audit completed and notice to be posted on website and noticeboard for public review.
- Grass cutting schedule now on website and can be made available for anyone not online. Please contact the PC
- Community Orchard the Parish are being offered the freehold on the land next to Waggon & Horses for use as an orchard.
- Defibrillator arranging for installation at the Culham Village Nursery
- 20mph speed limit change decision expected 18th July
- Crossing at Tollgate Road highways engagement team have agreed to meet with us in July to discuss concerns and hold a site visit
- Feedback from Community meeting additional meeting of councillors to be arranged to discuss feedback/suggestions and agree projects to take forward.
- Follow up requests for Culham Rec football pitch use/hire. Parking would be at the lock car park.
- Bus Route and shelters PC agreed for new shelters to be sourced. Bus company to be contacted to discuss route changes.
- PC discussed the planning application related to a large battery storage application on the Culham site P24/S14998/FUL Final comments to be agreed and clerk would submit.
- Next meeting 10th July 2024.

SO District Councillor's June 2024 Report

Greenspace Survey

Land use experts at <u>LUC</u> are supporting the council to gather information about greenspaces in the district. As part of this LUC are asking residents and organisations to complete a short online survey to understand how they use greenspaces in their local area. This ranges from parks and recreation grounds to natural spaces like woodlands and meadows.

General Election information

The council have now published new General Election 2024 pages, including information for candidates and agents, on the website – everyone can access these by going to <u>southoxon.gov.uk/GeneralElection2024</u>

New SODC Cabinet

Councillor David Rouane, Leader of South Oxfordshire District Council, confirmed details of the council's new Cabinet on Thursday 16 May. There are 3 changes to the previous cabinet; I am now in Cabinet, the member for Corporate Services, so most of the internal workings of the council. Details can be found on the <u>council website</u>.

Latest round of Rural England Prosperity Fund now open

The next round for Rural England Prosperity Fund (REPF) applications has now opened and organisations can apply for the scheme on the council's website: https://www.southoxon.gov.uk/south-oxfordshire-district-council/business-and-economy/advice-for-businesses/rural-england-prosperity-fund/

The fund offers up to £75,000 of capital funding for small businesses and community infrastructure projects that help to improve productivity and strengthen the rural economy and rural communities. Applications close at midday on Monday 1 July.

Funding categories are:

- Capital grants for small scale investment in micro and small enterprises in rural areas
- Capital grants for growing the local social economy and supporting innovation
- Capital grants for investment in capacity building and infrastructure support for local civil society
 and community groups

£1.2 million boost for local infrastructure in South Oxfordshire

Over the last six months, the council has transferred over £1.2 million to invest in vital infrastructure delivered by the council, town and parish councils and other community organisations. Investments have ranged from improved play areas and adding accessible features in a community swimming pool to improving public transport and extending a local rugby clubhouse.

As the local planning authority, South Oxfordshire collects financial contributions in the form of Community Infrastructure Levy (CIL) and Section 106 (S106) – this is the funding from housing developers to support the growth of the district when new developments are created.

S106 funding transferred between 1 October 2023 to 31 March 2024 has totalled £244,690. During this six-month period the council has also transferred £996,479 of CIL to town and parish councils that have experienced CIL liable development in their area. Follow this link for a breakdown of <u>S106 funds</u> have been approved and paid out and CIL monies transferred for South (the document should download automatically).

The Rural Crime Partnership is bringing together Thames Valley Police, local district councils and the Community Safety Partnerships to tackle crimes such as fly-tipping, burglaries and theft in rural areas. There will also be more support for local communities on crime prevention as well an increase in the gathering and sharing of information about rural crime. Initiatives include:

- New covert cameras to be used by the Police's Rural Crime Taskforce alongside off-road bikes to target criminals in hard-to-reach areas.
- Working with farmers to improve security. Farms will be eligible to sign up for security checks and will be given DNA marking kits for agricultural machinery. These kits include property marking labels to deter theft, and where theft happens enable machinery to be tracked back to the farm.
- A new Rural Crime Advisor will work to promote rural crime prevention and engage with rural communities, industries, farms and organisations such as Young Farmers and the National Farmers' Union, to help them become harder to target for criminals.
- New surveillance equipment will help district councils catch fly-tippers and tackle hot spot areas.

Planning for an emergency

There is a new government website for <u>emergency preparedness</u>. We have added the site to the emergency pages on the councils' websites. The new prepare campaign is not based on any imminent intelligence, just designed to help people prepare for emergencies, be more informed about hazards, and get involved in activities to support themselves and their community before, during and after an emergency. <u>https://prepare.campaign.gov.uk</u>





The girl born in September obviously cannot be Sara. Since she was talking to both Ophelia and Nora, it cannot be either of them. Therefore, it must be Dawn.


This leaves the girls Sara and Ophelia and the months October and November. Ophelia cannot be born in October, so she must be born in November, and Sara was born in October.
