

#### Talking point by Rev'd Jane Willis

In late October and early November we enter what is coming to be known as the season of Remembrance.

It begins with All Saints' and All Souls' Days. In the book of Revelation, the last book in the Bible, we have the most amazing picture of the great company in heaven, those who have faithfully followed Christ and gone before us. They serve as wonderful examples, an encouragement to us. Then at All Souls' we pause to remember and give thanks for all of those who have shared and shaped our lives, but who are no longer with us. For me, it is a moment to stop and to give thanks for all of those we have loved and lost and who we see no more; for all they have meant to us and to hear afresh of God's love and strength as we continue the journey of life without them. A solemn moment, but infused with the hope of the resurrection – the hope we have in Jesus, who has gone before us in death and resurrection – that we might live.

And then we come to Remembrance Sunday and Armistice Day. Here we pause, we stop, we keep silence silent and take a moment to remember those who have laid down their lives in order that we might enjoy the peace and the freedom we enjoy now. And as we do this of course we are deeply aware of the current conflicts in our world, and we pray for peace and all who work for it.

This is a season for reflection. In the Old Testament the people of God, the Israelites, were forever being called by God to remember – to remember who they were and where they had come from. But it was also a call to a future that could be different. When we remember, we too need to have a vision for the future.

In the Abbey, over a couple of weeks in October, there has been an art installation highlighting the plight of homelessness in Oxfordshire. I was extremely moved by the personal stories of homelessness that were presented but also by the incredible people who are doing their best to help make the future brighter for those in need. Some of us will consider it a calling from God to help others, others of us simply a response to our common humanity. Whatever our motives, I see God's work in this vision for a better world. I this life we work for the coming of God's Kingdom – secure in the promise that one day, as we read in the book of Revelation, it will be completely fulfilled. And for now we pray – and work – that God's kingdom may come, God's will be done – on earth, as it is in heaven.

#### Culham Parish Council (CPC) - October 9th - Summary of Meeting

The meeting was attended by six councillors, the Parish Clerk, plus two members of the public

The meeting opened with a review of the District Councillor's (DC) Report, highlighting South and Vale councils Joint Local Plan, which opened for 6 weeks of public feedback on Oct 1st. The DC's report also includes a review of flooding, with Environment Agency's flood maps and details of the Oxfordshire Flood Toolkit. Other notable mentions included:

- Homes for Ukraine Grant Scheme applications available via SODC website (www.southoxon.gov.uk)
- Didcot Eco-Fair 11AM 3PM, 2nd November Cornerstone
- Parking charge notice scam please note that local councils do not send text messages for parking fines

#### County Council (CC) update:

Community resilience is the main theme of the report, discussing local flooding and asking homeowners to report any flooding incidents, ensuring councils have up-to-date information on flood impacted areas. The CC report includes details of the Home Upgrade Grant, for low Energy Performance Certificate homes or homes heated by oil. The grant is available to homeowners where total household income is less than £39K.

#### **Clerks Report:**

The Clerk reported that the CPC audit was approved and confirmed that a traffic count has been requested for Thame Lane, a prerequisite for applying to reduce the National Speed Limit section down to 40mph. The Clerk also confirmed that a request for contractors to repair the track around the Green has been made.

#### **Grounds Maintenance:**

**Tollgate Road hedge** - CPC is asking for quotes to cut the hedge at the north end of Tollgate Road, plus remove the soil that has encroached on the pathway.

**Village grass cutting** - The final cut of the year is scheduled towards the end of the month, following which the village grass-cutting contract goes out to tender for 2025. The long grass adjacent to the Green will also be included in this cut, following a discussion with a member of the public during the meeting.

CPC discussed including cutting the entrance to the Glebe, a responsibility of SOHA, and will review costs.

**Tree maintenance** - CPC will seek a local tree surgeon, to address issues with fallen branches around the village.

#### **Members of the Public:**

Several topics were raised by members of the public including questions of grass cutting, flooding in the field downstream of the lock and access to the Thames path from the village centre.

**Flooding downstream of the lock** - The Thames path is currently blocked downstream of the lock, due to a broken culvert. The issue has been reported and awaiting repair.

**Access to the river** - During flooding, access to the river from the centre of the village (path next to the Lion), is regularly blocked. A member of the public asked if CPC could look at options, including a raised causeway. CPC will contact the relevant authorities to review.

#### **CPC Meeting:**

The meeting continued with a discussion regarding parked lorries on Station Road, which have restricted access to local residents. CPC has contacted the landlord of Culham Number 1 Site to address the issue.

Following an online planning seminar, CPC has made contact with a councillor at Abingdon Town Council (ATC), proposing closer contact between CPC and ATC over planning applications concerning Culham Campus and Culham new town.

The next meeting of CPC is expected to be November 13th 2024 at 7:30PM.

#### SODC District Councillor's Report October 2024

#### **Cllr Sam Casey-Rerhaye**

#### Joint Local Plan update

Following on from last month's special Cabinet and Council meetings, where approval was given for the districts' draft Joint Local Plan to be published for comment, it is now at the next stage.

Starting from Tuesday 1 October, we have made the plan available for comment – this will be a six-week opportunity for stakeholders to let us know if they think our JLP meets all the relevant requirements. We're aiming to submit it along with the comments we've received on to the Planning Inspectorate for formal examination in December.

This is a more technical part of the process as we carried out two highly successful public consultations during the development of the plan, which were recognised and commended at national awards ceremonies.

#### **National Planning Policy changes consultation**

The councils have submitted a formal response to the consultation. You can view the councils' response here: Council Responses to Consultations about Planning - South Oxfordshire District Council (southoxon.gov.uk)

Our consultation submissions are particularly important and timely given the work we are currently undertaking to progress our Joint Local Plan. Proposed changes to the national planning policy framework (NPPF), when published by government, could have a long-lasting impact on the future of our district.

#### **Flooding**

Please keep an eye on the <u>Environment Agency's flood warning map</u> to track any issues in your area. Please also be aware that this monitors the main rivers, and smaller watercourses which have also been affected and caused localised flooding last month.

While Oxfordshire County Council has primary responsibility for co-ordinating the local flood response, officers from across our councils are providing an important supporting role too.

Please look at the Oxfordshire Flood Toolkit, (on the county council's website) which contains useful advice on what to do if you're at risk of flooding, or indeed if you're currently experiencing a flood.

The District Council does not supply sandbags as they are relatively ineffective when compared to purpose designed flood protection products. If residents feel they would still benefit from sandbags, they can buy unfilled sacks and a supply of sand from most DIY stores and Builders Merchants.

## Of course, if anybody is in an emergency situation where people are at risk, they should dial 999 immediately.

We also advise all residents to investigate if their property is at risk of flooding ahead of bad weather and to take proactive action to protect their property. Information on flood risk in the area can be found here:

If their property is at risk they can sign up to the warnings in their area via the Environment Agency Website: www.gov.uk/sign-up-for-flood-warnings or by calling Floodline on 0345

988 1188.

Recycling and waste collections have also been disrupted with the recent flooding – we are posting regular updates on social media and on the councils' websites. Our crews are continuing to catch up on the waste and recycling collections which have been delayed due to the flooding. Our advice to residents is to leave your bins out and our crews will aim to return to as soon as possible, where it is safe to do so. If bins haven't been emptied after three days, residents can contact 03000 610 610.

#### **Homes for Ukraine Grant Scheme**

Community organisations are now able to apply for The Homes for Ukraine Grant Scheme with grants ranging from £250 to £2,000. This grant scheme is designed to help fund projects or services that support the successful integration and settlement of Homes for Ukraine guests into their new communities across the Vale of White Horse and South Oxfordshire.

The scheme opened for applications on 16 September. The grant scheme is being administered in partnership with Cherwell District Council. You can download the application form <u>from the SODC website</u> alongside this <u>guidance document</u>.

#### **Local Nature Recovery Strategy**

Every responsible authority (in our case the County Council) is required by law now to produce a Local Nature Recovery Strategy (LNRS). SODC is a member of the Local Nature Partnership, to which this responsibility has been delegated, and there have been a number of workshops involving large numbers of stakeholders over the past 18 months or so. The final draft LNRS will be available for public consultation for 6 weeks from 15<sup>th</sup> October, so I will send out links when it is launched.

#### **Didcot Eco-Fair**

Everyone is invited to the Didcot Eco Fair at <u>Cornerstone</u> on Saturday 2 November from 11am to 3pm when we will be celebrating all things green and showcasing our districts' fantastic sustainable businesses, with a clothing swap, great ideas on how to avoid food waste and advice on how to save energy.

Didcot Garden Town, in partnership with South Oxfordshire District Council, Vale of White Horse District Council and Sustainable Didcot, is hosting the free family-friendly event. Centre stage will be the Eco Marketplace with a variety of eco-friendly stalls specialising in handmade products, clothing, food and drink.

#### Parking charge notice scam

We are aware of a scam circulating locally and that some people in our districts are continuing to receive text messages about having to pay a parking fine. These are scams – we would not send these messages. If you receive one of these texts ignore the message and please spread the word to warn others

### An essential new reservoir for the South East

#### **Progress Update**

Thanks to everyone who participated in our summer 2024 public consultation on the new reservoir proposals. We received over 1,500 responses and more than 1,200 people joined our community events.

In August 2024, we secured government approval for our Water Resource Management Plan which sets out the action and investment needed to make sure your water supply is resilient and sustainable for the next 50 years and beyond.

To inform our design plans, work has now begun on geological surveys, including a clay compaction trial on the proposed reservoir site.

Ingram Murray explains how an unknown Great War Oxfordshire officer of was identified as a descendant of poet Wordsworth in upcoming event

- Museum volunteers helped identify remains of an unknown soldier of the First World War as Lieutenant Osmond Bartle Wordsworth
- Wordsworth was a descendant of William Wordsworth, and a survivor of the Lusitania disaster, before he fell in battle near Arras
- Talk at Faringdon's Buscot Park, shortly after Armistice Day 2024 and dedicated to the memory of Tom Shannon, a museum Trustee, who was involved in the search
- Proceeds from ticket sales support Soldiers of Oxfordshire Trust, preserving the county's military heritage

In a talk and fundraiser for the Oxfordshire military museum, Ingram Murray (father of historian and comedian Al Murray) will tell the story of the search for the identity of an unknown soldier killed in action during the First World War.

The talk, to take place at Faringdon's Buscot Park on 14 November 2024, details the search in which Ingram himself played a key role, alongside other museum volunteers, the Commonwealth War Graves Commission (CWGC), Ministry of Defence and Joint Casualty and Compassionate Centre (JCCC).

The story began in 2013 when a local farmer was digging in his private garden in the village of Hénin-sur-Cojeul discovered the remains of a body which local police determined dated from the Great War. Based on objects found with these remain, including a regimental button and fragments of uniform, it became clear the soldier had been an officer of the county regiment, The Oxfordshire & Buckinghamshire Light Infantry.

Tickets for the event, to be held at Buscot Park from 6pm (opening with a tour of Buscot House) are available now from the museum in Woodstock, and from their website. Proceeds from ticket sales support Soldiers of Oxfordshire Trust (Registered Charity No. ) preserving the county's military heritage, and sharing Oxfordshire's wartime stories.

Edgar has reinvented this most Victorian of stories and his masterstroke is having the author, **Dickens (Terry Atkinson)**, tell the story with his editor and friend **John Forster (Kieran Madden)**. The show begins with Dickens trying to write another book on poverty and child labour. Forster suggests this may be too bleak and sad for a Christmas time readership. The two of them construct the story in front of us, with themselves watching as the tale unfolds. This play's wonderful device shows us how Dickens decided on the various scenes.






