## Talking point by Rev'd Jane Willis

We've introduced a box for 'wondering' questions for assemblies at Dorchester St Birinus CofE Primary School – the children post their questions in the box, and then I or one of our Abbey assemblies team pick a question and then base our assembly on it. You might be amazed at the range of questions! A couple of weeks ago I chose 'Why are people in charge of the world and not octopuses?'

Researching in preparation I discovered some remarkable octopus facts (which it turned out the children already knew!) – including an Oxford scientist who argues that if the human race became extinct, through wars or climate change, octopuses are a likely species to evolve to become the dominant species on our plant. As we say, every day's a school day!

All this led us on to think about what is special about human beings, and our responsibility for our world. As we reflect on the deeply concerning developments in our world, what model of leadership do we find in the Bible? What does greatness look like through the lens of the scripture? The Bible speaks of a saviour who has come 'not to be served, but to serve, and to give his life as a ransom for many.' (Mark 10:43-45) The Bible gives us a picture of the 'downwardly mobile' God – of Jesus, our saviour and our example of true greatness:

6 who, though he was in the form of God, did not regard equality with God as something to be exploited,7 but emptied himself, taking the form of a slave, being born in human likeness.

And being found in human form,

- 8 he humbled himself and became obedient to the point of death even death on a cross.
- 9 Therefore God also highly exalted him and gave him the name that is above every name,
- 10 so that at the name of Jesus every knee should bend,

in heaven and on earth and under the earth,

11 and every tongue should confess that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father. (Philippians 2:6-11)

So as we approach Holy Week, Good Friday and Easter – may we pray for our needy world, and fix our eyes and our hope on Jesus.

# Notes from Culham Parish Council March 12th 2025 Meeting

The meeting was attended by six councillors, the Parish Clerk, plus two members of the public. The meeting opened at 7:36PM and included the District Councillor's report, the County Councillor's report, public participation, the Clerk's report, and discussions relating to the parish.

#### **Summary of SODC Councillor's report**

District Councillor Sam Casey-Rerhaye's March 2025 report covers key local updates. Residents must now purchase an annual permit for garden waste collection before April. A public consultation is open until March 17 on proposed changes to social housing allocation. The council is also encouraging owners of empty homes to seek assistance in bringing them back into use. A grant funding advice session for community groups will be held on March 20 in Didcot. A Green Party motion on electoral governance for Mayors was voted down in a special council meeting. Residents can find more details and participate via the council's website.

#### **Summary of County Councillors Report**

Councillor Robin Bennett's March 2025 report highlights key updates on local government reform, with Oxfordshire councils working towards a unitary authority by 2028. The County Council has approved a budget with over £50m for highways, alongside investments in flooding measures, active travel, SEND support, and early years funding. Capital spending includes £38.6m for road maintenance, £11.1m for the Watlington relief road, and £1.8m for walking and cycling infrastructure. Residents can participate in consultations on the Greenways project and local road safety measures. Updates on pavement widening, parking, and speed limits are also provided.

### **Public Participation**:

One member of the public asked about the recent road repairs leading up to the churchyard and cemetery, and whether it could be extended to improve house access. The PC confirmed that the work was a one-off commitment to ensure cemetery access, but would review this matter once The Green was purchased by the village.

#### **General Meeting:**

#### **Road Safety**

"Rumble strip" speed measurement devices have been installed on the High Street and Thame Lane. The PC is waiting for this report before finalising the location and installation of Speed Indicator Devices in the village.

The PC also discussed the A415/Tollgate Road junction crossing, which is progressing slowly, but has the attention of Olly Glover, MP Didcot and Wantage.

#### **Village Maintenance**

The contractors have almost finished widening paths on the Burycroft and Tollgate Road, improving pedestrian access.

The PC approved the purchase of new notice boards for the village. The PC also committed to creating a multi-year tree planting scheme.


The PC discussed the proposed community orchard adjacent to the Wagon and Horses, raising concerns about how waterlogged the site is. A proposal to arrange temporary access from Tollgate Road will not be pursued.

#### **Abingdon Reservoir**

The PC discussed the reservoir campaign group GARD, who have requested further assistance and representation from all communities. Additional information will be shared in the Mouthpiece.

The next meeting of the PC is April 9th at 7:30PM.

#### Garden Waste Permit: apply for your permit now!

This new scheme is now live and if you have or would like a brown garden waste bin, you will need to purchase an annual permit before April.

Please visit the council's website where you can follow instructions on how to do this. It's more efficient for the council (and so ultimately for you!) if you do it via the website if at all possible, and means people who don't have easy access to the website can more easily get in touch by telephone.

#### **Local Government Reorganisation**

Green Party councillor, Andrea Powell, brought a motion to a special full council meeting last month on local government reorganisation. The motion asked the Council leader to write to the Electoral Commission and the Minister regarding concerns over the electoral governance for Mayors – citing that the first past the post voting system the Conservative government brought in for Mayors and the high financial threshold for campaigns and deposits risked undemocratic and skewed outcomes that do not represent the areas fairly. The motion was voted down, with all the Libdems voting against as well as other councillors, despite the fact that similar motions were passed by Libdems in other councils in Oxfordshire. This was an odd outcome, as so many said they supported the sentiment but thought it wasn't the right time to have a motion on this! I struggle to think of a better time to discuss accountability and democracy than when the government is proposing the biggest reorganisation of local government since 1972.

The government are asking for outline proposals for new unitary councils to be sent to them by 21st March. Despite our grave reservations on the advantages of unitary councils and our concerns about the disadvantages – the waste of time and money at this critical time in the wider country and the danger of a loss of democratic accountability with larger councils- we are putting forward an outline proposal for 2 unitary councils for the wider area. One provisionally called 'Ridgeway council', would comprise South Oxfordshire, Vale of the White Horse and West Berkshire. The other would comprise Oxford city, West Oxfordshire and Cherwell councils (Oxfordshire council). The cabinets in both South and Vale believe this to be about the right size for the new unitaries, not so big to lose local accountability but big enough to be viable. As many Culham residents will be aware, Thames Water are currently proposing a huge reservoir, to be built between East Hanney and Steventon, including an intake and overflow pipeline that will join the Thames at Culham. #### Could you be their next victim?

Whilst many crimes are falling, such as burglary - down by a third since before the pandemic - sadly we are all more at risk online. We can all feel the benefits of living our lives in a more connected way, but with the convenience that technology brings, there are also risks, but a huge amount of cyber crime and fraud is preventable.

Scams can take place online, on the phone or in person. Here are some of the ways fraudsters may try and target you and the signs to spot to help you protect yourself:

**MAIL SCAMS** Common types of postal scams include fake lotteries and prize draws, offers of investments and inheritance windfalls. What to look out for: irresistible offers that are too good to be true; unfamiliar branding; not using your name; bad spelling and grammar.

**TELEPHONE SCAMS** Common telephone scams include investments, pension or computer support scams. The person calling often sounds professional and may pretend to be from a trusted organisation such as your bank, the police or a company you recognise. What to look out for: callers asking you to share personal or financial information or a passcode or pin; callers asking for remote access to your computer; callers trying to rush or pressure you into making decisions.

**DOORSTEP SCAMS** Criminals pose as legitimate business people selling goods or services that are faulty, overpriced, poor quality or non-existent. What to look out for: being asked for money upfront before providing any goods or service; No ID or proof of who they are; telling you they're doing work for neighbours to try and gain your trust.

**EMAIL, TEXT AND WEBSITE SCAMS** In what is known as Phishing, an email or text may appear to be from your bank or other company in order to trick you into revealing personal details. You may be asked to click on a link which takes you to a fake website where you will be prompted to enter your details. What to look out for: spelling or grammar mistakes in emails or texts; they may not use your name; an unusual email address which may be similar but doesn't match the company email; strong encouragement to click on a link.

#### Remember, anyone can be a scam victim.

If you spot a scam, always report it. You can also look out for other people who may be vulnerable to scams by joining friendsagainstscams.org.uk to help raise awareness throughout your community. For more information visit stopthinkfraud.campaign.gov.uk.

The Curlew's wonderful 'bubbling' call is one of the most evocative sounds of springtime in meadows and pastures across Oxfordshire. Something we cherish, but which is sadly under threat. The Curlew is arguably the most pressing bird conservation priority in the UK, where nearly half the breeding population has been lost over the last 25 years and where range contraction has seen Curlews disappear from many traditional sites.

Victory and liberation in Europe, 1945: Soldiers of Oxfordshire Museum launches new exhibition, From Conflict to Peace: Celebrating VE & VJ Day

- New exhibition featuring stories of Oxfordshire celebrating VE & VJ Day 80 years ago
- Accounts of soldiers from Oxfordshire and Buckinghamshire that liberated towns, POWs and concentration camps in the latter stages of the Second World War
- A programme of events at the museum and in Woodstock mark the anniversaries of VE Day and other milestones from 1945

Marking the 80<sup>th</sup> anniversaries of Victory in Europe and Victory of Japan Day, as well as those of many other key events from the final stages of the Second World War, Soldiers of Oxfordshire Museum (SOFO) is launching a brand-new exhibition. *From Conflict to Peace: Celebrating VE and VJ Day* will go on display from Tuesday, 1 April to Tuesday, 18 November 2025. The exhibition will cover the celebrations across the county itself, but also the experiences of Oxfordshire people serving in the armed forces throughout 1945, and for many, beyond the end of the war.

VE and VJ Day were both celebrated across the country in 1945, including many events in Oxfordshire. Women working for MI5 at Blenheim Palace recall hearing the bells of Woodstock's St Mary Magdalene Church ringing out for the occasion. In Oxford, locals recall street celebrations, with 'people dancing in line from St Giles to Carfax'.

For many Oxfordshire people serving in the armed forces, including the two county regiments, The Oxfordshire & Buckinghamshire Light infantry and Oxfordshire Yeomanry, 1945 had seen a series of tough battles before hostilities would come to an end, and the prospect of many new challenges in the wake of victory in Europe and over Japan.

The new exhibition focuses on personal accounts of the people who were there, both soldiers and civilians. It will also be supported by a programme of themed events at the museum, opening with a free talk by Dr Myfanwy Lloyd on the liberation of Bergen-Belsen on Saturday, 12 April, ahead of the 80<sup>th</sup> anniversary. Dr Lloyd's research, making contact with the families of a British soldier and a survivor of the camp, resulted in a new permanent display at SOFO Museum. Another talk, with local academic Anthony Glees, takes place on 17 April at 7pm, concerning the occupation of the island of Alderney during the war, and the Nazi war crimes perpetrated there that went unpunished. Professor Glees' was an advisor to Margaret Thatcher's War Crimes Inquiry, 1989-91.


On Saturday, 10 May, Woodstock will celebrate the 80<sup>th</sup> anniversary of VE Day with a special event in the town's Market Square, featuring live 1940s music, living history displays, food and drink from local businesses, and fun for all ages from 4pm - 8pm. On the same day, the museum will host Lt. Col. (Retd) Mike Tickner for his talk *Savage Wars of Peace*, from 2pm. The talk provides insight into the situation in eastern Asia following VJ Day and the Japanese surrender, as many nations saw an opportunity for independence, and Gurkha, Indian and British troops became responsible for restoring colonial rule in the region.

The new exhibition and accompanying events programme will offer visitors a chance to discover the part Oxfordshire and its people played in achieving victory and liberation in Europe and in East Asia, 80 years on.

The last item will be Henry and his Wives, a light-hearted cantata by Tim Cook, with illustrations by Adrian Brooks, about the much-married monarch and his unfortunate consorts. If you enjoyed The Ancient Mariner last year you will enjoy this one, so do come.

The concert will last about 45 minutes, entrance is free and there will be an opportunity to make a donation for the upkeep of the Abbey.

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
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
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


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
