Talking point by Talking point by Revd Jane Willis, Team Rector

'We plough the fields and scatter the good seed on the ground...' we sing lustily every at every Harvest Festival.

Though to be honest, for the most part, we don't. When our children were little we had some good friends, Jonathan and Alex. Jonathan had always wanted to be a farmer, but had somehow ended up an insurance broker. So, to make up for the lack, they had three allotments. They were a bit of an inspiration to me. One day – the nearest I would ever get to the image of an earth-mother, I made bread with our girls (this was in the days before bread-makers!) – and felt rather pleased with myself. Later that day I told Alex at the school gate – she smiled and said 'Ah yes, we're

growing wheat on our allotment.' It was clear I was never going to keep up!

For most of us the nearest we get to food production is a vegetable patch – and with fresh produce readily available in our supermarkets now apparently independent of season or the elements – we find ourselves somewhat removed from its source – and hence to any sense of dependence on God for all that he gives us. Earlier in my ministry I was privileged to serve in a number of deeply rural North Devon communities. Two of our churches were in farmyards

and one of our congregations was made up entirely of farmers and their families. Suddenly all the metaphors of

harvest that had featured in my preaching in previous years were these people's real lives – and I was very much a lay person. I will never forget passing the peace shaking huge farmers' hands, or placing the communion bread in hands rough and stained from farm work. These people's relationship with land and place was like nothing I had ever known – and yes, farmers are always talking about the weather: asking me to pray for rain, or for it to stop raining (in North Devon it was usually the latter!). Here these people's livelihoods were deeply dependant on the elements

– and on the grace of God. Churches were packed at Harvest – and the other agricultural festivals of Rogation and Plough Sunday.

So this harvest may we remember our farming community, pray for them and give thanks for them. May we tend our gardens and vegetable plots with love and care and encounter God in the goodness of his creation. And wherever we earn our living – in the city, in schools, in healthcare, in retirement or wherever – may we indeed know that 'all good gifts around us are sent from heaven above' – and 'thank the Lord, yes thank the Lord, for all his love.'

Culham Parish Council - September 10th 2025 Summary of Meeting

The meeting was attended by five councillors, the Parish Clerk, Robin Jones and members of the public. The meeting opened at 7:30PM with the Chair welcoming new members to the village. The meeting started with public participation, continued with the Parish Councillor's report, the County Councillor's report, the Clerk's report, plus the general meeting.

Public Participation:

Eight members of the public joined the meeting, raising road safety concerns, specifically relating to the route to Europa school, plus discussing flooding and drainage issues. Cllr Robin Jones responded to the road safety concerns, confirming that progress was being made with the Tollgate Road/A415 crossing, with further news expected soon. Cllr Robin Jones also confirmed that the Oxfordshire County Council Chief Executive and colleagues had recently visited Culham, to discuss the crossing, plus general infrastructure issues cycling from Abingdon to Culham.

Hedge growth and potholes were also discussed, with the PC and members of the public discussing setting up a work-party to cut back some foliage.

Flood Mitigation: A question was raised to Cllr Robin Jones asking why OCCs annual gully cleansing program did not occur as scheduled this summer. Cllr Jones will investigate the schedule, as there are concerns that the High Street may have some blocked drains. The PC discussed setting up a Flood Group, in collaboration with the public, to request a Flood Risk Survey for Culham.

Waste Bins: following public feedback, the recently installed bins at the north end of the Burycroft have been removed, with the dog waste bin due to be relocated away from the house and road. With the bins becoming a magnet for fly-tipping, the PC will consider where to relocate the rubbish bin.

Summary of County Councillors Report

Cllr Robin Jones gave a brief review of his report, which can be found in full on the Parish Council website. Oxfordshire County Council is undertaking a major road resurfacing programme (covering 111,000 m² across 36 sites) through to mid-October, while Thames Valley Police recently stepped up enforcement of speeding and dangerous driving on the A4074 using drones. The council is leading on environmental performance, currently ranking first nationally via Climate Emergency UK, and has pledged to clear every roadside drain, gully and manhole annually. Robin will question why Culham's scheduled clearance has not occurred yet. Other priorities include promoting active travel, particularly around school journeys, and deploying £1.8 million in Home Office funds to tackle serious violence in the Thames Valley. Locally the councillor raised questions about school transport provision in Berinsfield, future mineral extraction in South Oxfordshire, and traffic management around key river crossings and the HIF1 relief road's terminus. The council is also consulting on a congestion charge for Oxford (with revisions proposed), and has opened a £10,000 Councillor Priority Fund (applications due by November 2026) for projects in the division.

Summary of Parish Councillor's Report

District Councillor Sam Casey-Rerhaye summarised her monthly report, highlighting that South and Vale's Waste team have updated their phone number - 01235 422123, with the local team advising on waste enquiries. Sam also noted that a recent IT migration project was running slightly behind schedule, with the planning permission process two weeks behind schedule. South and Vale expect normal service to return shortly. Sam's report also included details of a local grant scheme, with £7500 pot available for local initiatives.

General meeting:

Speed monitoring and Speed Indicator Devices (SIDS)

The first of the SIDS poles have now been installed, with the second one due soon. The PC will purchase the initial SIDS devices this month, for installation this Autumn.

Recreation Ground and Community Orchard:

The PC has received confirmation from the land owner that an unused area of the recreation ground can be used for a community orchard. The PC will set up a working group to manage this project. The PC will prepare to initiate a community building feasibility study for the recreation ground.

Bus Stops

Following the Community Meeting, the PC will review access to the bus stop outside of the old Lion pub, before pursuing bus shelters.

OxRAIL 2040 - Oxfordshire County Council has opened OxRAIL 2040, a consultation relating to regional rail development for the next decade. Residents are encouraged to submit feedback up until October 1st via the council website - https://letstalk.oxfordshire.gov.uk/oxrail-2040.

The meeting adjourned at 9:15PM.

The next PC meeting is scheduled for 8th October, 19:30.

St Paul's Church – Going Forwards

There was a meeting at the church on Tuesday 9 September, led by Rev Jo Allen, team vicar of the Bridge Group. The meeting was attended by about 25 residents of Culham, the Rector of Dorchester Rev Jane Willis and Rev Jane Manser who conducts many services here.

Firstly, Jo outlined the decision of the PCC to move the church's service pattern to something more like a 'festival' basis, where services not be on a regular monthly basis but, instead, hold services to coincide with church and local festivals such as Christmas Easter, Remembrance, Harvest etc. Details will be provided in the Mouthpiece.

The next service will be a Harvest service on Sunday 5 October.

There was also a discussion about the ongoing plan to re-order the church. This has 'in principle' approval from the diocesan authorities and the PCC would now like to take this forwards. However, it is recognised that more resource (in terms of effort) is going to be needed than that which the PCC have at their disposal and so residents of Culham are invited to offer whatever they can in terms of help with moving this forward, so that the church building can be more of a community-focussed space. This would include installation of loos, a kitchen re-flooring and better heating.

A 'questionnaire' was distributed at the meeting about interest in helping out with regular services etc and also the re-ordering and a copy is included here. Councillor Community Grants

New phone number for waste inquiries

From 8th September, residents should use a new number for district council waste and recycling enquiries: 01235 422 123.

The previous number (03000 610 610) is being phased out and will be switched off soon.

01235 422 123 is the new number is for all household waste, recycling, food, garden waste (collections only*), bulky waste collections, clinical waste collections and street cleaning services. It is also the number to call to report fly-tipping and abandoned vehicles.

*For queries about garden waste permits, residents should continue to call 01235 422 422.

For enquiries relating to Household Waste and Recycling Centres (HWRC's), please continue to contact the county council on 0345 310 1111.

Planning service update

Earlier this year, the council carried out a major piece of planned essential maintenance work on the council's IT system. The work affected the availability of many of the council's online services. The majority of our online services returned to normal in July, however, the planning team has been impacted for a longer period and unfortunately, they still have a backlog of planning applications. The team is currently unable to offer a full level of service to residents and customers but are phasing the reintroduction of services. At present they are working approximately two weeks behind the standard time for processing planning applications. I am pleased to confirm they have resumed offering a pre-application advice service in connection with major planning application work; for non-major pre application work, this will be reviewed again by 15 September.

I would like to thank you all for your patience during what has been a challenging time during a complex change to the IT systems.

Give your views the new Licensing Act Policy

There are changes planned to the Council's policy which determines how licensing decisions are taken and how licensed premises can operate in our district. The proposed updated Licensing Act Policy includes new references to: Martyn's Law, the Ask for Angela scheme and promoting initiatives for women and girls' safety; and updated guidance on staff training about safeguarding and evacuation and emergency procedures.

You can find out more and have your say via our consultation page. Comments are open until 16 October.

Annual Elector Canvass

The electoral register annual canvass is the requirement to contact residents each year to ensure they check that their details on the register are up to date.

Residents will receive either a yellow letter or an email - this will ask them to

visit <u>householdresponse.com/southandvale</u> to either confirm 'no change' to our records, or to make changes online, if required.

Anyone who doesn't respond by 3 October, or who hasn't registered an email address with the council, will receive a green letter in October.

Please encourage people to respond by email as it avoids having to send a letter to them, saving printing, admin and postage costs.

The email will go out from Monday 8 September from <u>elections@southandvale.gov.uk</u> with the subject line "South & Vale District Councils - Annual Electoral Register Check" and will contain both council logos. Residents can find more information

Seasonal Spotlight - Autumn

It's that time of year when the trees will be changing colour, the air is getting colder and fresher, and we can't help thinking of warm drinks, cosy clothes and playing in the crunchy leaves. As we enter Autumn, it can be tempting to cut back all the dead and dying vegetation in our gardens and green spaces. It's worth considering that many of these woody stems will become perfect winter homes for insects as they enter hibernation and can create areas of architectural beauty in our homes and communities.

In Oxfordshire, the hedgerow species we generally recommend planting (for their capacity to provide for both people and wildlife year-round) and you're most likely to see in your local area include Blackthorn, Spindle, Common Buckthorn, Guelder Rose, Wild Privet, Cherry Plum, Dog Rose and Hazel. Fruiting season for many of these species starts from late summer to early autumn. As such, by this time of year, most of the species listed above will be fruiting. Hawthorn berries have traditional use in heart-strengthening natural medicines but also act as a vital source of food for caterpillars, moths, and migratory birds. Keep your eyes peeled for **spindle**, which has



vibrant autumnal colours with vibrant pinks, and the leaves turning from a deep green to a beautiful red.

Riverside trees

The native white, crack, pussy, osier and goat willows are a familiar sight along the Thames and its tributaries. Willows provide shelter for birds, mammals, including bats, otters and water voles. Their leaves are the larval foodplant of the Purple Emperor, Large Tortoiseshell and Comma butterflies and their catkins the earliest sources of food for bees. Both the male and female flowers (catkins) carry sugary nectar, and the male flowers also carry protein rich pollen, which is so important for developing bee larvae. Willow nectar is also a major energy source for Blue Tits during early spring. Traditionally managed by 'coppicing and 'pollarding', mature trees can be cut to form a thick stump or 'coppice stool' that considerably extends the life of the tree and lets in light to the shrub layer. Some Crack Willow pollards are known to have lived for 1000 years. Willow is also a useful hedge plant in damp conditions.

Trees for Bees

Trees are an important, stable long-term source of food for bees and other pollinators, providing thousands of flower heads all in one place. Plant a variety of tree species selected to benefit bees and other pollinators, with species that flower at different times of the year to provide nectar, pollen and nesting sites as well as offering a haven for other wildlife and cleaning the air and water and storing carbon. Hedgehog Friendly things to do this autumn and winter

- Put out a shallow dish of water or make sure your ponds are easy to get out of for hedgehogs (shallow edges or a platform / ramp), so they have water to drink
- Leave a wild patch each year with piled up logs or leaves that you don't disturb
- Always move your burn piles before you light them as hedgehogs and frogs often use them
 to sleep in (this is, after-all, how hedgehogs were once upon a time cooked to be eaten!).
 Thankfully it is now illegal to eat this endangered species

- Avoid using pesticides or herbicides as this will make hedgehogs very ill. Find out more here www.hedgehogrescue.org.uk/hedgehog-friendly-slug-pellets/
- If you want to put out food, cat or dog food is best

Is it really your bank calling?

Sadly, we know that one of the most common crimes that we can all be vulnerable to is fraud. It can take many forms but

impersonation of your bank, a government agency or even the police is a tactic that many criminals will use.

If you receive a suspicious call, independently contact your bank or the relevant agency using an official telephone number – do not use numbers given to you by the cold caller. But who has the time to dig out and verify a number for your bank?



That's why the 159 service was created. If you get a call from someone claiming to be your bank you can simply call 159 and you'll be put through to an automated service which can put you through directly. The system is supported by most of the major banks.

The idea is to give one trusted number that the public know they can call safely in order to be put through directly to their bank.

In some cases, however, fraudsters will try to keep the line open, so that when you call back, you're actually talking to the fraudsters again.

The best way to avoid that is to wait for 15 minutes, to ensure the line is clear, or call from another phone if you have one available. Then simply call 159 to be put through directly to your bank.

NEVER disclose any personal or sensitive information over the telephone.

Whilst fraud is one of the biggest risks to us all from criminals it is also one of the most easily prevented crimes. A dose of healthy scepticism goes a long way, and always be cautious with unsolicited calls, emails and texts.

If in doubt, take a moment, do not be pressured into sharing information or handing over money. Check with someone else if you're suspicious. thamesvalley-pcc.gov.uk/get-involved/community-fund.

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


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
