Talking Point by Rev'd Claire Wren

A fresh spring day, perfect for getting away from the crowds. Nothing to spoil the view. A sudden pain in my foot causes me to pause. Leaning on a wooden post that is barely able to take my weight, I gasp as a splinter pierces my palm. I am wobbling on one leg battling to untie my lace. Smooth the sock, shake the shoe. A stone, no bigger than a pea, rolls downhill. I wriggle my toes back into their boot. Instant relief.

There was another perfect day. A man walked up a hill surrounded by a crowd, barely able to take the weight of the wooden beam across his back. A collective intake of breath as nail pierced flesh. Tug of rope, hammering of stake, a precarious cross was secured into place.

It is later, three days later, when another stone rolls away. Shake out the garments, smooth out the folds. There is nothing here but hope.

As I was reflecting on the huge stone that was moved on Easter morning, I considered how the smallest of stones inside my shoe can have a massive impact on my comfort and my ability to move forward. It is almost ridiculous to compare the two events. One occurs frequently and is in no way newsworthy; the other is a unique occurrence around which the whole of history pivots. If the removal of a tiny pebble from a shoe can provide such relief from pain and allow us to progress, how much more should the removal of The Stone move us.

My favourite Easter hymn is this one by Edmond Budry:

*Thine be the glory, risen, conquering Son,
endless is the victory thou o'er death hast won;
angels in bright raiment rolled the stone away,
kept the folded grave-clothes where thy body lay.*

*Lo, Jesus meets us, risen from the tomb;
lovingly he greets us, scatters fear and gloom;
let the church with gladness hymns of triumph sing,
for her Lord now liveth, death hath lost its sting.*

*No more we doubt thee, glorious Prince of Life;
life is naught without thee: aid us in our strife;
make us more than conquerors through thy deathless love;
bring us safe through Jordan to thy home above.*

Thine be the glory, risen conquering Son, endless is the victory thou o'er death hast won. The next time you shake a pebble from your shoe, think of the God who loved the world so much he went through the pain of death to bring us all into his wonderful light.

Christ is risen! He is risen indeed, Hallelujah!

Summary of Culham Parish Council Meeting Held on Wed 11th March 2026

Attendees: Chris Pritchard, Mike Richmond-Cooper (note taker), Caroline Baird, Siobhan Sargeant, Nacho Gimenez

Apologies: Denise Corney, Sam Casey-Rerhaye

The meeting started at 19:32.

Chris opened the meeting, starting with apologies from Denise and Sam.

Summary of Parish Councillor's Report - Cllr Sam Casey-Rerhaye

Cllr Sam Casey-Rerhaye's March 2026 report highlights key financial, planning, and community updates for South Oxfordshire. The 2026–27 budget has been approved, including Green Party amendments to create a £50,000 nature fund and a grant scheme supporting small housing charities and Community Land Trusts. Council tax will increase by £5 for a Band D property, bringing rates closer to the rural national average, though district council tax remains a small portion of overall bills. On planning, the council has joined others in urging the government to reconsider proposed changes to the National Planning Policy Framework that could limit local authorities' ability to enforce higher environmental standards in new developments.

The report also promotes current opportunities and consultations, including the £750,000 Community Infrastructure Levy (CIL) grant fund for local projects, open until 30 March, and the launch of the Local Government Reorganisation consultation on future council structures.

Residents are reminded to renew garden waste permits before 1 April to avoid service disruption. Additional highlights include upcoming live performances at Cornerstone and encouragement for residents to engage with council initiatives or seek support directly.

Summary of County Councillor's Report - Cllr Robin Jones

Cllr Robin Jones reports progress on several local infrastructure and policy initiatives across the Berinsfield & Garsington division. A key development is the opening of a consultation on safety improvements along the A415 at Culham, including a new signal-controlled "Sparrow" crossing for pedestrians and cyclists, traffic calming at Thame Lane, and upgrades to shared-use paths and street lighting. These measures aim to improve road safety and support active travel, particularly for families cycling to Europa School. At the February Full Council meeting, the Liberal Democrat budget was approved, with successful Green Party amendments introducing a £900,000 dedicated fund for footpaths, cycleways, and pavements, alongside secured funding for community cohesion and climate resilience initiatives.

The report also highlights enforcement and community efforts, including a multi-agency operation targeting illegal garage activity and antisocial parking in Garsington and Littleworth, resulting in closures, arrests, and safeguarding interventions. Additional updates cover ongoing county initiatives such as mapping community hubs, highways maintenance reporting, and access to crime

and sewage data. Practical infrastructure work continues, with increased resources to tackle potholes, scheduled road resurfacing, and the successful demolition and reopening of the Botley Road rail bridge. The council has also committed to annual clearing of roadside drains, encouraging residents to report missed issues to maintain effective drainage.

Clerk's Report - Chris summarised the Clerk's report

Members of the public

A member of the public discussed the oak tree that recently fell on the Recreation Ground. He suggested that the tree has value and if dried and planked, and could be used for the benefit of the community. He asked that careful consideration was made when deciding the future of the wood.

The member of the public also asked whether it was possible to automatically email out minutes or Mouthpiece articles, once they are uploaded onto the parish website. The PC will review.

Representing members of the public, Caroline raised concerns regarding parking on the High Street, following a recent delivery lorry that caused damage to a wall and pillar belonging to Home Farm. The PC discussed the matter and agreed that parking restrictions should be considered opposite the driveway to Stable Cottage, Clock House, East Wing and The Other House and also on the corner of the Glebe. Siobahn will contact John Beale to ask for advice.

The PC also requested that the Clerk remind the nursery that staff and visitors should use the lock carpark for parking.

General Meeting

Pavilion Feasibility Study - Trevor Avery from lapd architects joined this month's meeting, presenting three options for the re-development of the recreation ground pavilion. The options will be shared with the village community at the upcoming Community Meeting in May. In parallel, the PC will work with the Diocese to ensure a suitable length of lease is available to justify redevelopment. The community will be able to give their input and preference, before any work commences.

SIDS - 20mph awareness camera on Tollgate Road

The Parish Council discussed the recently installed camera, which regularly shows cars driving over 20mph. The Parish Council will review the data capture from the SIDS later in the Spring.

Proposed changes to Local Government

The PC discussed the three proposals relating to local government changes, but were unable to align on a preferred option. The PC will respond to the Oxford City/Three Councils plan, as all agreed this was the least preferred option, with loss of green belt and lack of alignment to Abingdon. Members of the PC will respond individually to proposals and recommend the community follow suit.

HIF Road

The PC discussed the recent news regarding road closure between Appleford and Sutton Courtenay, raising concerns regarding the long-term closure heading towards Didcot. The PC also discussed the future access across Sutton Bridge and will ask Cllr Sam if she has scheduled a meeting to clarify future access.

SODC District Councillor's Report – March 2026

Budget 2026-27

The budget was passed with some Green party amendments agreed, and a commitment by the Libdem administration to further investigate some other suggestions made by the Green group – the amendments were to create a £50,000 parallel nature fund to the Climate Action Fund, and a grant scheme to cover start-up costs and legal fees for small-scale housing charities and Community Land Trusts for development of plans and capital bids.

Council tax will rise by the maximum (£5 for a Band D home) allowed before a referendum needs to take place, case in the last 6 years (but the District part of your council tax is only around 6%, so a very small proportion). This is to bring South Oxfordshire's council tax in line with the national average for rural areas.

Planning and the government's new National Planning Policy Framework

South Oxfordshire and Vale of White Horse have joined a host of other local authorities, businesses and non-government organisations in signing an open letter from the Town and County Planning Association (TCPA). The letter has been sent to Rt Hon Steve Reed MP, Secretary of State for Housing, Communities and Local Government.

The letter supports the climate-focused policies in the Council's proposed Joint Local Plan; it urges government to reconsider proposed changes to the National Planning Policy Framework (NPPF) that would prevent local authorities from requiring higher energy efficiency standards for new buildings. These have been included in the Joint Local Plan. The letter warns that by restricting local authorities in this way, the draft NPPF would halt progress on the delivery of buildings in England that release less carbon and it would also the ability of all councils to address climate change locally and meet our climate obligations.

Garden Waste Permits for 2026

Existing garden waste permits will expire on **31 March**. To continue receiving fortnightly collections from **1 April** and to avoid any interruption to their service, residents will need to buy a new permit. **New permit sales will open mid-February**. The vast majority of the 69,000+ customers will be able to buy their permit via their 'MyAccount' or by visiting southandvale.gov.uk/gardenwastepermit

Message from Matthew Barber, Police and Crime Commissioner

New team launched to help tackle criminals on our roads

Last month I joined Thames Valley Police Officers for the launch of the Force's new Roads Policing Unit (RPU) Tasking Team.

The RPU Tasking Team will deliver a more strategic and targeted approach to road safety across the Thames Valley using data and intelligence to identify areas of greatest risk and highest harm. The team will then proactively deploy to these locations to directly address the behaviours and offences driving those risks.



The creation of the Roads Policing Unit Tasking Team will be a major boost to Thames Valley Police's capability to bear down on the dangerous and illegal drivers who put others at risk and criminals using our roads.

In addition to their proactive work, the team will support local policing operations wherever possible and will also target those individuals known to us through intelligence, including those involved in drink or drug driving.

In a two day operation last month to mark the launch of the new team, police officers were joined by other agencies including Immigration Enforcement, HMRC, taxi licensing and Environmental Health.

During the operation 16 arrests were made for drug driving and immigration offences along with over a hundred dangerous vehicles taken off the road.

Of course this kind of work is what Roads Policing Officers do each and every day, but the purpose of this team is to be much more proactive. Previously officers would often be called on to respond to collisions on our roads or to assist other officers with arrests. The RPU Tasking Team is intended to focus more dedicated resources to take criminals and dangerous drivers off our roads.

Wildlife River Corridors

Wildlife corridors: living tapestries woven together to produce a natural passage connecting fragmented habitats. These vital tapestries allow animals to safely migrate, find food, reproduce, and adapt to environmental changes while keeping our landscape functioning as a single, connected system rather than a scatter of isolated fragments. Thus, migration is the key behavioural adaptation that allows nature to thrive.

But with increased development of land, through housing, road building, and agricultural activity, the mobility of wildlife has become restricted, areas isolated, and the genetic diversity of our ecosystems reduced.

And this extends to our rivers and waterways. These waterways, which are so key to providing vital habitat for freshwater wildlife, now find themselves confined and carved apart by human pressures. Strengthening both land and river corridors restores the weave of the landscape. It rebuilds the very connections that allow ecosystems to function, species to thrive, and nature to adapt in an ever-changing environment.

The call for wilder river corridorsAt the Evenlode Catchment Partnership (a collaboration of over 20 organisations and many more individuals, united by a shared commitment to improving the water environments within the Evenlode catchment, hosted by Wild Oxfordshire), we value the role of these corridors as lifelines that connect segregated habitats, while championing the benefit to communities when local green and blue spaces are cared for.

We have developed innovative approaches to river restoration, such as the creation of wetlands, ponds, and fish passages, alongside natural flood management efforts like the installation of leaky woody dams and storage bunds. These interventions not only restore natural habitats but also reduce flood risks, benefiting local communities.

Additionally, intensive farming practices rely heavily on fertilisers and pesticides, and that dependence comes at a financial cost to farmers, poorer water quality, and shrinking space for wildlife. When fields are pushed to produce more, the landscape loses the complexity and breathing room that rivers, insects, birds, mammals, and soil organisms need to function well.

Sustainable farming offers a different path. Across Oxfordshire and the Evenlode catchment, farmers are being supported to adopt approaches that work *with* natural processes rather than against them.

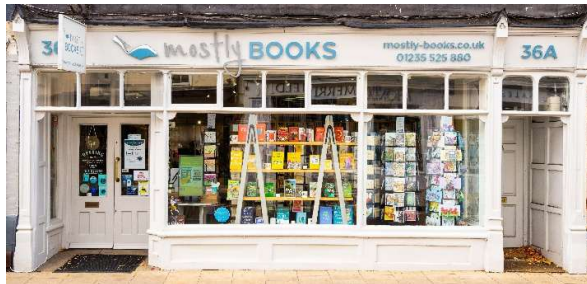

High Street, Long Wittenham

At Pendon Museum discover highly realistic miniature buildings, landscapes, railways and transport on a grand scale, portraying an idyllic view of English rural life as it was in the 1920s and '30s. Explore thousands of delightful details in our dioramas and see model trains in action, alongside our exhibitions, audio guides, and fascinating insights into pre-WW2 rural life from our expert volunteer guides.



- The Vale Scene is probably the largest diorama based on accurately reproduced buildings, landscape and railways to be found anywhere in the world. All scale replicas of real historic buildings in the Vale of White Horse, the scene is filled with charming details of village life, including people and animals.

One of the buildings is Parva Station which is modelled on Culham Station

- The Dartmoor Scene is an imaginary Great Western branch line set high along the southern edge of Dartmoor. It features an extensive viaduct which carries the train lines across wild moorland scenery.

- The Madder Valley Railway features an eclectic mix of buildings and transport; its historic trains run on a few select days throughout the year (check the website for details).

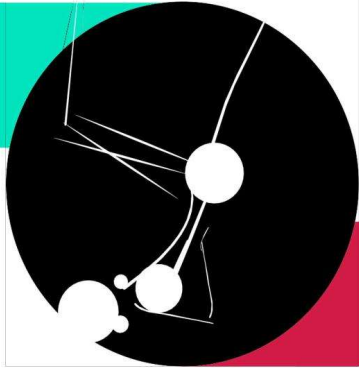

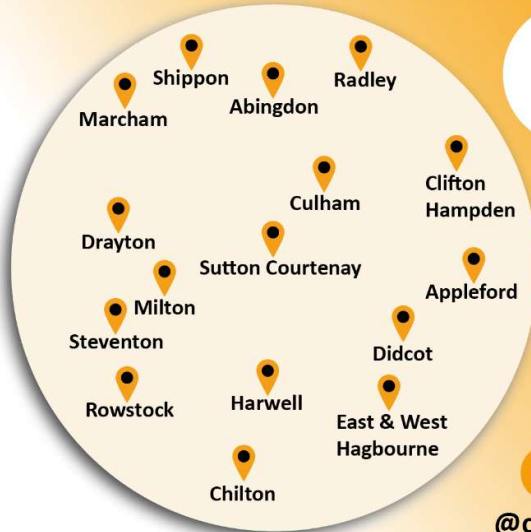
